


#### **Directions to our Parish:**

### Fr. Panapiotis' Message





The news from Aurora, Colorado pierced the heart of the nation like a knife. A brilliant young man with a tremendous future did the unthinkable, ending the lives of twelve others and wounding scores of unsuspecting fellow Americans. It seems that this kind of random acts of violence are increasing in number every year. People are perplexed by the frequency as well as the magnitude of them. The chilling thought is that the killer is one of us! It could be the young man down the street, or the other one further down! Whom can you trust? And what is the solution to this problem? How could did this man acquire legally so much firepower without anyone noticing? Something is seriously wrong with this picture!

The political pundits, as usual, grabbed on the opportunity to offer us their 'valuable' opinion. The solution, some of them suggest, is the tightening of the gun laws, prohibiting people from buying guns as

easily, or perhaps increasing the waiting period; doing more background checks. And then the objections rise up from the other side: This is an American civil liberty issue. Any more gun restrictions will violate the Second Amendment. And the passionate debate goes on for days, even weeks, until an other political issue arises and they all turn their attention to that one forgetting once more the issue of violence until it strikes us again in some big way.

Of course the problem is much bigger than the occasional mass murder we see every so often. The senseless killing of mostly young people continues undisturbed in the black and hispanic ghettos of America with primarily illegal weapons, acquired on the streets of America, weapons with far more firepower than anyone can purchase at a gun shop. But this discussion is not happening on the networks. No one offers a solution for that.

In addition, no one talks about the youths who grow up without a father figure in their lives, no moral compass and no guidance, who eventually turn to the thugs of the "hood" to give them validation and purpose, quickly becoming both actors and victims of street violence. While 6,000 Americans died at the front line in Iraq and Afghanistan in the last 10 years of war, more than 30,000 people have died from bullets on the streets of America, shot by other Americans during the same time - a war far greater and bloodier that is cutting deeply into the soul of this nation.

But let me get back to the more bizarre incidents which catch our attention immediately, like the Virginia Tech incident, the 2011 Tucson shooting and finally the most recent one in Aurora, CO. This last one is the most perplexing to all: How can a white, middle-class, intelligent, well educated American end up doing such a horrific thing, everyone is asking?

It seems to me that part of the answer in all three of these cases is found in the fact that there is some serious mental illness involved, definitely serious enough to lead a person to such horrific behavior, but unfortunately not considered serious enough to alarm those who come into contact with these individuals. The other part of the answer is found in a common element in all three cases: The fact that both family and community have been missing from the lives of all these men in the years preceding their violent behavior. They were all isolated in their sick world behaving and acting in ways that would have been quickly noticed if they lived with people who cared for them, but went unnoticed in the anonymous modern societal order.

The individual isolation in our society has led us to live lonely lives even in the midst of the most populous cities, but most frighteningly has left us unmonitored by relatives, friends and loved ones to disintegrate into behaviors that end up in tragedies. It's not all about the gun laws, unfortunately. It's also about our relationships or lack thereof; it's also about some other laws, which govern mental illness. Even professional healthcare providers are disabled by legal restrictions to care effectively for mentally ill patients, even if they know that their behavior is seriously irrational. In the absence of family to monitor and provide care on a daily basis, these individuals run the risk of crossing the boundaries. Unfortunately, the current laws make it very difficult to commit someone to psychiatric care. Even the hospitals are unable to hold them for more than a short time unless they have clearly indicated that they plan to hurt themselves or another. Law enforcement's hands are tied until the person commits a crime! The result is what we have seen at Virginia Tech, Tucson and Aurora.

If we truly want to debate this issue, we must honestly consider what has happened to the family unit, the nuclear family as well as the extended family. We must consider the value of the local church and synagogue, the positive effect of faith and morality, but more than anything else, the comfort and security provided by a close knit community where people look out for each other. We must draw lessons from the experience of the past in order to built a better future.

Whether violence occurs on the streets of the inner city, the campus of a college or a movie theater, the root of the problem is found in the disintegration of the support systems provided by family and community. Hospital staff and government social workers cannot replace the long-term, loving, unconditional care which the nurturing embrace of a family can offer.

### The Three Heroes of Aurora: They gave their lives to save others

Twenty-five-year-old <u>Jon Blunk</u> was sitting next to his girlfriend, Jansen Young, at the midnight premiere of "The Dark Night Rises" when the gunman (who shall remain nameless) opened fire in the dark theater. Blunk instinctively pushed his girlfriend to the ground and threw his body on top of hers. Blunk, a security guard, served eight years in the Navy and was in the process of re-enlisting in hopes of becoming a Navy SEAL, <u>family and friends said</u>. He was killed in the gunfire; his girlfriend survived.

Twenty-four-year-old <u>Alex Teves</u> dived on top of his girlfriend, Amanda Lindgren, when the gunfire erupted. Covering her body, he took the bullets so they did not harm her. She survived the massacre; he did not.

<u>Matt McQuinn</u>, 27 years old, threw his body in front of his girlfriend, Samantha Yowler, as the shooting continued. Yowler survived with a gunshot wound to the knee; McQuinn's body absorbed the fatal shots. By all appearances, these men believed that a man has a responsibility to protect a woman, even to the point of death. They believed that there are things in life worth dying for and the innocent woman sitting next to them was one.

They believed, to put it simply, in a code of honor. They put the lives of the women before their own, an old fashioned notion to be sure, but certainly an honorable one (if you have any doubt, ask the survivors). Their instincts were to protect, not run away.

This is especially important given the state of many men today. Record numbers of men aren't working or even looking for work. Record numbers aren't marrying or even acting as fathers to their children. These men need heroes to imitate whom they can relate to in everyday life, not just make-believe superheroes who catch their imagination for an hour or two. They need heroes like the Aurora three.

### The Transfiguration of our Lord on Mount Tabor


Celebrated on August 6 **Hymn of the Feast** 

Apolytikion of the feast (Grave Tone)

You were transfigured on the Mount, Christ God revealing Your glory to Your disciples, insofar as they could comprehend. Illuminate us sinners also with Your everlasting light, through the intercessions of the Theotokos. Giver of light, glory to You.

### **Commentary:**

Our Lord had spoken to His disciples many times not only concerning His Passion, Cross, and Death, but also concerning the coming persecutions and afflictions that they themselves would endure. Since all these evils were near at hand, but the enjoyment of good things which they hoped to receive in their stead was yet to come, our Savior desired to give them full assurance, evidently and openly, concerning that glory which is prepared for those



who endure to the end. Therefore, fulfilling that which He had promised shortly before, that "there be some standing here which shall not taste of death, till they see the Son of man coming in His Kingdom" (Matt. 16:28), He took His three foremost disciples and ascended Mount Tabor, where He was transfigured before them. His face shone like the sun, and His clothes became white as the light. Suddenly, together with this dread and marvelous effulgence of light, there appeared those pinnacles of the Prophets, Moses and Elias, who spoke with the Lord Jesus concerning His saving Passion which was about to take place. Standing before Him as reverent servants, they showed that He is the Lord of both the living and the dead, for Moses came forth from Hades, having died many centuries before, and Elias, as it were from heaven, whither he had been taken up while yet alive. After a little while a radiant cloud overshadowed them and out of the cloud they heard that same voice which had been heard at the Jordan at the Baptism of Christ, testifying to the Divinity of Jesus and saying: "This is My beloved Son, in Whom I am well-pleased; hear ye Him" (Matt. 17: 5).

Such are the marvels, truly worthy of God, celebrated in this present feast, which is an image and prefiguring of the future state of the righteous, whose splendor the Lord spoke of, saying: "Then shall the righteous shine forth as the sun" (Matt. 13:43). It is because of this that the Kontakion of this Feast is said daily (when there is not a great feast) in the Service of the Typica in perpetual commemoration of the glory that will be the lot of the Saints. According to tradition, the Lord's Transfiguration came to pass forty days before His Crucifixion; this is why the Transfiguration is celebrated forty days before the Exaltation of the Cross.

In giving birth, O Theotokos, you have retained your virginity, and in falling asleep you have not forsaken the world. You who are the Mother of Life have passed over into life, and by your prayers you do deliver our souls from death.

From the Lity. Tone Plagal of the First Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit.


Come, O gathering of those who love to keep the feasts, come and let us form a choir. Come, let us crown the Church with songs, as the Ark of God goes to her rest. For today is heaven opened wide as it receives the Mother of Him who cannot be contained. The earth, as it yields up the Source of life, is robed in blessing and majesty. The hosts of angels, present with the fellowship of the apostles, gaze in great fear at her who bore the Cause of life, now that she is translated from life to life. Let us all venerate and implore her: Forget not, O Lady, your ties of kinship with those who commemorate in faith the feast of your all-holy Dormition.

Come, O ye people, and let us sing the praises of the pure and most holy Virgin, from whom the Word of the Father ineffably came forth incarnate. Let us cry aloud and say: Blessed are you among women and blessed is your womb that held Christ. Having delivered your soul into His holy hands, do you, O most pure, entreat Him for the salvation of our souls.

Tone Plagal of the 4th (by Sergios of the Holy City) Glory to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit, now and ever and unto ages of ages. Amen.

At your departing, O Virgin Theotokos, to Him who was ineffably born of you, James the first bishop and brother of the Lord was there, and so was Peter, the honored leader and chief of the disciples, and the whole sacred fellowship of the apostles. In discourses that showed forth heavenly things they sang the praises of the divine and amazing mystery of the dispensation of Christ our God; and they rejoiced, O far-famed Virgin, as they buried your body, the origin of the Life and holder of God. On high the most holy and venerable of the angelic powers bowed in wonder before this marvel, and said one to another: 'Open wide your gates and receive her who bore the Creator of heaven and earth. With songs of praise let us glorify her precious and holy body, dwellingplace of the Lord on whom we may not gaze.' Therefore we too, as we keep your feast, cry out to you, O far-famed Lady: Raise up the Christian horn and save our souls.


### The Beheading of St. John the Forerunner and Baptist

Celebrated on August 29 Hymn of the Feast

Apolytikion of the feast (Second Tone)

The memory of the just is celebrated with hymns of praise, but the Lord's testimony is sufficient for thee, O Forerunner; for thou hast proved to be truly even more venerable than the Prophets, since thou was granted to baptize in the running waters Him Whom they proclaimed. Wherefore, having contested for the truth, thou didst rejoice to announce the good tidings even to those in Hades: that God hath appeared in the flesh, taking away the sin of the world and granting us great mercy.

**Commentary:** The divine Baptist, the Prophet born of a Prophet, the seal of all the Prophets and beginning of the Apostles, the mediator between the Old and New Covenants, the voice of one crying in the wilderness, the God-sent Messenger of the incarnate Messiah, the forerunner of Christ's coming into the world (Esaias 40: 3; Mal. 3: 1); who by many miracles was both conceived and born; who was filled with the Holy Spirit while yet in his mother's womb; who came forth like another Elias the



Zealot, whose life in the wilderness and divine zeal for God's Law he imitated: this divine Prophet, after he had preached the baptism of repentance according to God's command; had taught men of low rank and high how they must order their lives; had admonished those whom he baptized and had filled them with the fear of God, teaching them that no one is able to escape the wrath to come if he do not works worthy of repentance; had, through such preaching, prepared their hearts to receive the evangelical teachings of the Savior; and finally, after he had pointed out to the people the very Savior, and said, "Behold the Lamb of God, Which taketh away the sin of the world" (Luke 3:2-18; John 1: 29-36), after all this, John sealed with his own blood the truth of his words and was made a sacred victim for the divine Law at the hands of a transgressor.

This was Herod Antipas, the Tetrarch of Galilee, the son of Herod the Great. This man had a lawful wife, the daughter of Arethas (or Aretas), the King of Arabia (that is, Arabia Petraea, which had the famous Nabatean stone city of Petra as its capital. This is the Aretas mentioned by Saint Paul in II Cor. 11:32). Without any cause, and against every commandment of the Law, he put her away and took to himself Herodias, the wife of his deceased brother Philip, to whom Herodias had borne a daughter, Salome. He would not desist from this unlawful union even when John, the preacher of repentance, the bold and austere accuser of the lawless, censured him and told him, "It is not lawful for thee to have thy brother's wife" (Mark 6: 18). Thus Herod, besides his other unholy acts, added yet this, that he apprehended John and shut him in prison; and perhaps he would have killed him straightway, had he not feared the people, who had extreme reverence for John. Certainly, in the beginning, he himself had great reverence for this just and holy man. But finally, being pierced with the sting of a mad lust for the woman Herodias, he laid his defiled hands on the teacher of purity on the very day he was celebrating his birthday. When Salome, Herodias' daughter, had danced in order to please him and those who were supping with him, he promised her -- with an oath more foolish than any foolishness -- that he would give her anything she asked, even unto the half of his kingdom. And she, consulting with her mother, straightway asked for the head of John the Baptist in a charger. Hence this transgressor of the Law, preferring his lawless oath above the precepts of the Law, fulfilled this godless promise and filled his loathsome banquet with the blood of the Prophet. So it was that that all-venerable head, revered by the Angels, was given as a prize for an abominable dance, and became the plaything of the dissolute daughter of a debauched mother. As for the body of the divine Baptist, it was taken up by his disciples and placed in a tomb (Mark 6: 21 - 29). Concerning the finding of his holy head, see February 24 and May 25.

### The Practice of "Confession" In the Bible

#### Old Testament

"He shall confess his sin that he has committed. And he shall make full restitution for his wrong, adding a fifth to it and giving it to him to whom he did the wrong." Num. 5:7

"Those of Israelite descent separated themselves from all foreigners, and they stood and confessed their sins and the guilt of their fathers. While they stood in their places, they read from the book of the law of the LORD their God for a fourth of the day and spent another fourth of the day in confession and worship of the LORD their God." Nehemiah 9:2-3

### **New Testament**

"Confessing their sins, they were baptized by John in the Jordan River." Matthew 3:6

"And there went out unto John all the land of Judaea, and they of Jerusalem, and were all baptized by him in the river of Jordan, confessing their sins." Mark 1:5

"Therefore confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed. The prayer of a righteous person is powerful and effective." James 5:16

"Also many of those who were now believers came, confessing and divulging their practices." Acts 19:18

"Fight the good fight of the faith. Take hold of the eternal life to which you were called when you made your good confession in the presence of many witnesses." 1 Timothy 6:12

"If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness." 1 John 1:9

### The Holy Sacrament of Forgiveness

### How to Prepare for Confession

- a. Find a quiet place where you can be alone and where you can concentrate on the love of God; His love for the world and for you. Think of the Christmas story and how Our Lord became Man because He loved us, how He experienced death on the cross because He loved us, and how, at Easter, He resurrected, because He loves us.
- b. Think of what God wants you to be and where you are in life, at this very moment. Ask yourself: Am I worthy to be called a creation of God? When Christ returns at the second coming, will we be able to tell him that in spite of our failures in life, we sincerely tried to make amends in our shortcomings?
- c. Once we have gone through (a) and (b), we are now ready to face the most difficult question of all: How have we offended God? In examining ourselves, what sins have been committed? One easy way of doing this is to put down on a piece of paper all the sins committed recently, or since your last confession. Details and unnecessary descriptions should be avoided.
- d. Once you have completed your list, check them with the following "self-examination" questions based on the Ten Commandments, which will also help you to crystallize your thinking before you share your feelings with your Father confessor. (These were basically taken from a little Archdiocesan pamphlet entitled, "The Neglected Sacrament, A Practical Guide to Confession and Happiness.")

#### First Commandment

"I Am The Lord Thy God; Thou Shalt Have No Other Gods Before Me." Have I loved God as much as I should? Have I been more interested in myself than in God? Have I tried to serve God and keep His Commandments? Have I been vain about my personality, personal appearance, clothes, possessions, my family, ability, success in games or in accomplishments? Have I given way to anxiety instead of turning to God for help? Have I failed to trust in God and His mercy? Have I failed to pray to God sincerely and faithfully? Have I put my self before God?

#### **Second Commandment**

"Thou Shalt Not Make Unto Thee Any Graven Image."

Have I put another person before God's law; by not going to Church, or by committing some other sin to please that person? Have I neglected my duties to God through fear of ridicule? Have I been insincere about my religion? Have I been receiving Holy Communion without the appropriate preparation?

#### Third Commandment

"Thou Shalt Not Take Thy Name of The Lord Thy God in Vain . " Have I profaned the Holy Name of God? Have I misused the Holy Name of Jesus'? Have I cursed anyone or sworn a false oath? Have I paid proper attention to holy persons and things? Have I broken any solemn vow or promise?

#### **Fourth Commandment**

"Remember The Sabbath Day, to Keep it Holy." Have I missed Church on Sundays? Have I always kept Sunday as it ought to be kept? Have I done unnecessary work on Sundays? Have I been irreverent during Church Services? Have I caused anyone to profane the Lord's day? Have I been ashamed of my religion or my Church?

#### Fifth Commandment

"Honor Thy Father and Thy Mother."

Have I respected my parents and been grateful enough for all they have done for me? Have I disobeyed them or neglected them? Have I contributed as much as I should to the support and happiness of my parents? Have I tried to bring my children up properly? Have I given as much care as possible to the religious life of my family; with regard to daily prayer, church going, etc? Have I honored God, my Heavenly Father, by working or treating my employers as well as other co-workers honestly and diligently?

#### Sixth Commandment

"Thou Shalt Not Kill."

Have I killed if not in outward deed, perhaps in my heart? Have I wished for some one's death? Have I been angry unjustly? Have I harmed others by ridicule or contempt? Have I defamed anyone who needed help? Have I gossiped about people? Have I been cruel to anyone? Have I failed to forgive anyone? Have I shown proper respect toward life?

### **Eighth Commandment**

Have I ever stolen anything, or shared in stolen goods. Have I cheated in business, games or school? Have I kept things that did not belong to me? Have I given as much as I am able to charitable causes and to the Church?

#### **Ninth Commandment**

"Thou Shalt Not Bear False Witness."

Have I lied often? Have I concealed the truth? Have I exaggerated too much? Have I let others receive blame for my faults? Have I judged others for sins which I also have committed? Have I been deceitful, unfair, hypocritical?

#### **Tenth Commandment**

"Thou Shalt Not Covet. "

Have I been jealous of others? Have I envied them because they have more money; or are better looking; or more successful; or because people pay more attention to them? Have I been grieved at the prosperity of the others? Have I ever wished the downfall of anyone? Have I failed to thank God for what He has already given me? Have I thought that God is partial?

# You are a Member of the Church! Are you a Steward also?

A question always asked by our parishioners is "How can I be a member of the Parish? I am already an Orthodox Christian. Isn't that enough?

The answer to this is very simple: All people baptized and chrismated (confirmed) in the Orthodox Church are automatically members of the Church, but it takes a little more to be "members in good standing" in the Orthodox Church and in the Parish. First, it is required that a person be married in the Church and live their life as an Orthodox Christian, participating in the Holy Sacraments, in order to be in good standing within the Orthodox Church. If one has been married outside the Orthodox Church or has gone through a civil divorce and has not obtained a Church divorce may not be in good standing with the Church. Please check with the priest of the parish in order to find out where you are.

### How can one be a member of the Parish?

It takes participation in the parish by supporting the operation and ministries of the parish to be a member in good standing. In order to do that, you have to fill out the Membership/Stewardship Form and indicate on it how you are going to participate in the Parish with your Time, Talents and Treasure. When you join the Parish in this way you make a Pledge to God that you will support the work of the Church with the gifts He has given you so that the Gospel may be preached and people may be saved through the ministries of the Church. 
### The Necessity of Stewardship

### **UPDATE ON THE PEW FUND**

Dear Fellow Parishioners,

We have completed the installation of pews in our sanctuary. Through our Lord's blessings and your generous donations, this work has been accomplished in record time. We are still planning to install appropriate seating in the choir area and purchase some chairs. Both will compliment the pew design and complete the seating needs of the sanctuary. We hope to have all of this completed by late fall. To date, we have spent \$87,373.32, and we have raised \$67,485.00 Pledges towards the total campaign are now at \$85,700.00 When all is complete, we expect to have spent \$100,000 which was our initial projection.

As you can see, the pledged amount of \$85,700.00 will not cover the total campaign amount of \$100,000. We have a short fall of \$14,300. If you have not made a pledge to this campaign, please do so if you are able. We are all enjoying the pews, and it would be great if we all contribute.

#### To All Parishioners:

Thank you again to those who volunteered during our recent Marietta Greek Festival. Hopefully, you have all had a chance to recover and catch up on your other responsibilities.

Final Festival results have been compiled. We hosted a record 16,670 attendees over the weekend, with no major incidents. The Festival grossed a record \$355,248, with a resulting net profit of \$162,197. As in past years, \$15,000 of this net profit will be paid to the church operating fund to cover incurred costs such as utilities, repairs, cleaning, etc.

In addition to our record profit numbers, the Festival was a success in many other respects. We estimate that a record 3,000 of our attendees took advantage of our sanctuary tours. Our new church bookstore gave us an additional opportunity to share our Greek Orthodox religious beliefs with our community through the sale of literature. The new cafeteria-style food service was successful in serving our guests faster and more efficiently than in the past and, therefore, will enable us to serve greater numbers in the future. Italian/Greek Ice was hugely popular, grossing over \$5,000 in its first year. And, our Visitor's Guide set a record for sales, grossing \$30,806.

I am so proud of our community and its leadership for again coming together to host a successful Festival. Although this is the time of year for us to rest, please consider volunteering for a leadership position in next year's Festival. 

### Bethlehem sites given Unesco World Heritage status

### The UN's cultural agency, Unesco, has voted to add the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem and its pilgrimage route to the list of World Heritage Sites.

The Palestinian delegation welcomed the approval of its bid to get protected status for the church, built on a site some believe was Jesus's birthplace.

Israel and the US opposed the move, saying it was politically motivated.

It was the first such approval since Palestine was controversially granted membership of Unesco last year.

Bethlehem's Church of the Nativity - originally constructed in 399 above a cave traditionally believed to be the birthplace of Jesus and rebuilt after fire in the 6th Century - is among the holiest sites in Christianity

The short section of the pilgrimage route from Jerusalem to Bethlehem - following the historical route believed to have been taken by Mary and Joseph - is used for the procession of the Patriarchs at Christmas.

An estimated two million people visit the two sites every year.

At a meeting in the Russian city of St Petersburg on Friday, Unesco delegates voted 13 to six in favour of giving both of them World Heritage Site status "on an emergency basis", entitling them to UN protection and funding for restoration work the Palestinians say is urgent.
