

Coffee vs Heaven?



Sometimes people wonder why they come to church. Many people, actually, have said that they come to church in order to see their friends and socialize. They come late for the Divine Liturgy and are the first ones to rush out to the church hall for the coffee-hour. Many of these people complain about the length of the service and find all the reasons to justify their behavior. But, in fact, the root of the problem is their own understanding of why we come to church, or rather, their misunderstanding of what the church can really offer to them.

If they only knew that the Divine Liturgy is the opening of the door to Heaven, it is the opportunity to be present at the Throne of God, it is the amazing encounter of the Living God in person where we may draw power, wisdom, health,

strength and life, they would treat their time in the Divine Liturgy not as a burden but rather as a divine privilege and their attitude would change completely.

How can we discover this amazing understanding of our time in church? By actually being there! Nothing can replace the experience of placing ourselves in the presence of God! We can only know God by putting ourselves on a trajectory to meet Him. Nothing can stop Him from touching our souls and filling our hearts with His joy except for our negligence and refusal to do so. If we enter the church leaving everything else behind, if we immerse ourselves in the Divine Worship as the angels and all the saints who are already in His Presence, if we open our hearts to His loving-kindness, we will taste of that Kingdom which is already here and made available to us, as well. This is the mystery which is revealed to us in the Divine Liturgy.

Christ came to earth in order to open the door to the Heavenly Kingdom. He actually became the door to Heaven. He keeps calling out: "I am the door; if anyone enters by me, he will be saved, and will go in and out and find a pasture." (John 10:9) All we need to do is respond to His call and enter to enjoy the results of His efforts.

The coffee of our parish is pretty good, I must say (most of the time), but Heaven is far better! Why would anyone neglect the Kingdom of Heaven and go only for the earthly coffee? That is the greatest mystery for me! Besides, they can get better coffee at Starbucks, but they can experience Heaven only in church!

Join us for the full stretch of the Divine Liturgy, my brothers and sisters. Come at 10:00 am and let go of the worldly cares of your life. You have time to worry about everything after the Liturgy. 
This week, following the Sunday of the Publican and the Pharisee, we do not fast on Wednesday and Friday in remembrance of the hypocrisy of the Pharisee and acknowledging that fasting alone is not acceptable to God if it is not accompanied by humility and repentance.

On Humility and Repentance

Humility should not be confused with weakness of mind. It is, rather, the desire to not be arrogant. Humility is exhibited when one lowers himself in order to help the other climb higher. It is the act of helping others improve themselves by accepting them where they are and lifting them up.

Repentance is a process of transforming one's heart and mind from sinfulness to righteousness. It is a change of path, a change of direction from evil to good. Repentance is an act of humility, where one recognizes his/her faults and vices and tries to correct one's self.

Christ is the *prime example* of humility; although He was God He lowered Himself to become like us in all things except sin. Hence, He needed no repentance for He was sinless.



ST. HARALAMBOS THE HIEROMARTYR FEBRUARY 10

Apolytikion of St. Charalambos the Martyr and Miracle-Worker

"As pillar unshaken of Christ's holy Church and lamp ever-burning to all the world, you emerged, O wise Charalambos.

In all the world you shined with the martyrdom you suffered.

You dispelled the dark night of the idols O blessed.
Thence with daring do intercede to Christ that we may be saved."

In the early Church, the term "martyr" was originally used when characterizing the Apostles as witnesses of Christ's life and resurrection [Acts 1:8, 22]. Due to the persecutions that the early Christians endured, however, the term was applied to those who gave their lives for the Christian Orthodox Faith.

In Greek, the word "martyras" means, "witness" and, the verb form, to be martyred, means to "bear witness" or "give evidence." Though martyrdom was not a constant experience for the early Church, it was a possibility with which the early Christians had to reckon. It was the consummate act of faith for as the Lord said: "Greater love has no one than this, than to lay down one's life for his friends" (John 15:13). Before actually being executed, however, the martyr usually endured extreme physical and moral sufferings.

One of the saints recorded to have endured the greatest suffering of any martyr was the presbyter Haralambos. As a second century priest in Magnesia, Asia Minor, he served his people with great faith and love. His reputation as a man of God had spread throughout the area and many people came to the Faith through his preaching of the Good News of Jesus Christ.

During a period of extreme persecution, Haralambos did not hide, but openly and boldly preached the Christian Orthodox Faith! When Haralambos was finally arrested for having the courage to preach the Gospel, his persecutors devised a plan of persecution for everyone to witness. Although he was tortured repeatedly, he never denounced his faith in Jesus Christ. For several months this persecution went on and not once did Haralambos weaken in his faith. Forced to suffer extreme pain and degradation, he continued to preach and many miracles and conversions took place among the people.

When the soldiers thrashed the skin from his body Haralambos said: "Thank you, my brethren, for scraping off the old body and renewing my soul for new and eternal life," In the final moments of his life, moments before he was to be beheaded, Haralambos lifted his hands to heaven and prayed for all humankind: "Lord, You know that men are flesh and blood; forgive them their sins and pour out Your blessing on all." Following this prayer the saint gave up his soul to God and died without the sword being laid to his neck. The Holy Spirit filled the martyrs and inspired them.

Although we may not experience similar persecution in our day and age, we, too, are called to follow the blessed example of the martyrs. Having partaken in the Holy Mysteries of the Church through Holy Baptism, Chrismation and the Eucharist, we are obligated to follow the example of the saints and strengthen our Church with our own sacrifice. As stewards of our precious Christian Orthodox Faith, we are called to support our local parish, strengthening and enabling the Orthodox Church in America to preserve and proclaim the Faith of the Apostles, Martyrs and Fathers of the earlier centuries. Let us be witnesses of the Faith by offering our Time, Talents, and Treasure to the glory of God.



«Εγκαίνια» - «Consecration»

The transformation of the world to a New Creation

The Greek word for "consecration" of a church is «εγκαίνια», which literally means "the entrance into a new state", a "new existence", the "New Creation", which was brought about by Christ through His Resurrection.

The consecration of this church will make this building a "new space" a "sacred space"; it will dedicate this space to the order of "the New Creation" which transforms the fallen man into renewed humanity, healed, perfected and made eternal in the Risen Christ.

After the consecration, this building will become a place of transformation for those who enter it. People will enter "fallen" and emerge from it "renewed and perfected" in the image of God. This human transformation will be accomplished through the mystery of the Holy Eucharist, our union with the Risen Christ, for the miracle of the transformation of bread and wine to the new existence of the Body and Blood of the Risen Lord will also transform those who touch it and partake of it.

When people enter into this sacred space, they should know that this will change them. They should expect to receive purification, salvation and sanctification, for they will be placing themselves in the presence of God, for He will now dwell in this place with all His Power and Glory. Here God will be worshiped, as Heaven will bend to meet the earth at this very place.

Hence, this consecration is not just about the building; it is primarily about those who will enter this building; it is about those who will confess their Faith in the Risen Lord; just like the holy martyrs, who will be forever buried in the Altar of this sanctuary, who through their confession received the "Kingdom", so also we will be enabled to become citizens of the "Kingdom".

We are called to become "martyrs" (literally "witnesses") of the Faith in the True God, the Father, His Son Jesus Christ and His Holy Spirit. We are called to "let our light so shine before men, that they may see our good works and give glory to our Father who is in heaven". (Cf. Matthew 5:16) This sanctuary will become the springboard of "Good Works" that please and glorify God.

Upon its consecration, this sanctuary will become the platform of the proclamation that the Kingdom of God has come to earth. The spiritual treasure of the Orthodox Faith, which gives eternal life, will now be made available to those who step onto these hallowed grounds. This building will become an ark of salvation for those who enter it. Here, men and women will be made disciples of the Lord; here men and women will be baptized; here men and women will be taught to observe the precepts of life as given to us by Christ. And the Lord will be with us always to the close of the age, as He promised. (Cf. Matthew 28:19-20)

HOLY TRANSFIGURATION GREEK ORTHODOX CHURCH Consecration Service Overview

In the early years of Christianity, Christians were persecuted and killed for their faith in Christ. In those days, the Christians met in underground burial places and celebrated the Eucharist on the graves of the martyred Saints. When the persecutions ended, and the Church was allowed to exist, the custom of celebrating the Eucharist over the graves of Martyrs continued by placing Holy Relics in the Altar at the time of the Consecration of the new houses of worship. *In this manner, every Christian Church is built on the Blood of the Martyrs and founded on their faith in the Lord for Whom they died.*

We celebrated the opening of the doors of our new sanctuary in January of 2004. In these past eight years since then we have been abundantly blessed and have made wonderful strides towards the beautification of our Church both in iconography and furnishings. Unlike the "Opening of the Doors" ceremony, however, which focused on the Great Doors of the Church, the Consecration Service on April 27, 2013 will be centered around the Holy Altar Table. The Holy Altar Table is the center of the celebration of all the Sacraments and divine services of the Church, most especially the Holy Eucharist which takes place every Sunday (the Lord's Day) and on other Feast-days of the Church.

The Bishop will consecrate the Holy Table and the walls of the church by anointing them with Holy Myrrh and asking for God's Grace to come upon the structure as well as the people to renew and sanctify us.

Once a building is consecrated and dedicated to God it becomes *holy ground* and *holy space* where God dwells and meets with His people. Hence, a consecrated church building cannot be used for any other purpose except for the worship of God.

What exactly takes place during the ancient rite of the Consecration of an Orthodox Church?

The Service of the Consecration of a house of worship is one of the <u>major</u> Sacraments of the Orthodox Church. Prayers are offered to bring God's Grace to the people. Certain actions are also taken.

The following sanctifying actions take place:

- **1.** The Three Processions around the Church Building with prayers offered at every side of the building thus establishing the grounds of the church as *sacred*.
- **2.** The Placing of, and Sealing of, the Holy Relics in the Altar Table.
- **3.** The Washing and Anointing of the Altar Table with the Holy Myrrh.
- **4.** The placing of the four Icons of the Evangelists at the four corners of the Holy Table, from where the proclamation of the Gospel begins.
- **5.** The covering of the Holy Altar with the savano (katasarkion) (a white cloth symbolizing the shroud with which the body of Christ was wrapped before placed in the tomb).
- 6. The Placing of the new Altar Coverings and other Holy Articles on the Holy Table.
- 7. The Lighting of the Unwaning Light (the oil lamb that burns on the Holy Altar all the time).
- **8.** The anointing of the walls of the church with Holy Myrrh.

Once these actions have taken place, the holy sanctuary of the Holy Transfiguration Greek Orthodox Church will be Baptized, Chrismated, Sanctified, Consecrated, and dedicated to God for <u>eternal use</u> as an Orthodox Christian House of Worship.

The Consecration as Baptism

The Consecration of our Sanctuary can be a reminder of our own baptism and an encouragement to truly live out our lives in the light of God's Kingdom. The fact is that any consecration, whether it is the consecration of our church or the consecration of our persons, is an end and a beginning, a death and a re-birth; we die to the world and are raised up again with Christ; we are born again through the Holy Spirit to a new life with God.

Our baptism was a renewal and initiation into the Church. It was a participation in Christ's death and resurrection in a mystical way. We died to sin and were buried with Christ as we descended into the water and then were risen again with Him to eternal life. We were renewed through this process and transformed through water and the Spirit to a new life.

Following our immersion in water, we were consecrated to God as we were anointed with the Holy Chrism (holy Myrrh). We received "the Seal of the Gift of the Holy Spirit" and became Temples of God sanctified by Him, just as the Lord Jesus requested from the Father:

"I do not pray that you should take them out of the world, but that you should keep them from the evil one. They are not of the world, even as I am not of the world. **Sanctify** them in the truth; thy word is truth. As you sent me into the world, so I have sent them into the world. And for their sake I **consecrate** myself, that they also may be **consecrated** in truth. (John 17: 15-19).

The Greek term for the consecration of a church building is "εγκαίνια ναού", which literally means "renewal of the temple". The church building is anointed with the Holy Myrrh during this service and thus renewed and dedicated to God as a Sacred Temple, a sacred space that can only be used for the worship of God.

Through the relics of the martyrs buried into the Holy Table and the anointing of the Holy Spirit through the hands of the bishop, the building will be sanctified and the community of Holy Transfiguration will be girded forever with spiritual armor so that it may resist the ways of the world. It will also provide a sacred haven for worship in which the heavenly banquet can be truly experienced in the here and now as we gather together to celebrate God's mystical and Holy Liturgy.



"Be renewed, be renewed, O New Jerusalem, because your light has shown, and the glory of the Lord has come upon you. This house has been founded by the Father, this house has been made firm by the Son, this house has been renewed by the Holy Spirit, which illumines and supports, and sanctifies our souls."

"In early times, while the temple was consecrated, Solomon offered to the Lord sacrifices of animals and holocausts. When you were pleased in us O Savior, to forgo the formalities and let the Truth be known, the whole world offers to You the bloodless sacrifices to Your glory, because You are the Lord of all things and make everything holy through Your Holy Spirit."



DEVELOPING A DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP

God came to earth as a man to teach and demonstrate to us two of His most important revelations – how we should love God and how we should love each other. An important way to enhance our love for God is to learn more about Him. In order to learn how to love one another we need to learn more about the living body of Christ, His Church, including that portion of the Church which is the closest to us – our parish. We are provided with many opportunities for such learning; we have the Intro to Orthodoxy Class, the Spiritual Book Club and the Bible Study Classes offered by our parish. In addition, we have the weekly bulletins, the monthly Syndiakonia, and the occasional e-mails sent to us from the parish office. It has been said that we will obtain the equivalent of a college education by thoroughly reading a daily newspaper for twenty years. We can obtain an immense understanding of God, especially His relationship to us and His Will for us by reading the materials which the parish provides. We convey our love of God every time we utilize these opportunities to broaden our knowledge and understanding. The more we do this, the more our minds descend into our hearts, the closer we come to God and His Creation.

What does this have to do with stewardship, one may ask? Whenever we read or experience something which would also help our spouse, our child, our grandchild, and/or a friend to grow in faith and to better understand how the Church works, including our parish, we should try to bring it to those peoples' attention, as well. In this way, not only will we develop in faith ourselves, but we will serve as an agent in the spiritual development of those who are close to us.

From the Anaphora of the Divine Liturgy

We offer ourselves and all creation to the Lord at every Divine Liturgy with the words, "Your Gifts, of what is Yours, we offer unto You." We acknowledge that everything we offer to God is a gift from Him. We take what God has given to us and we return it to Him as an act of our thanksgiving and praise.

As stewards of God's gifts, we return to Him a portion of our time, talents and treasures for Christ's work on earth through His Church.

The Christian Stewardship Program is an opportunity to respond to Christ's love by perpetuating His ministry through the Church. Stewardship places the responsibility to support the Church exactly where it belongs, on us. Let us offer then from the goods He has given us back to Him: "Your Gifts, of what is Yours, we offer unto You."

How much should I offer to the Church in order to support the work of God?

Proportionate giving: This involves two things; Firstly, that our level of giving rises out of our level of income. Secondly, that our giving is an offer of thanksgiving for His blessings.

We should ask ourselves "what is a worthy level to determine my Stewardship?" The Bible gives much guidance by teaching us that direct giving to God and His work should be proportionate to our income, wealth and possessions. Each person is to give according to his or her own ability.


The Old Testament laid down the standard by asking for a percentage of one's income. This provides for us the principle that giving should be in proportion to our income. Each Steward should determine what percentage of his or her income will be committed to Christ and the Church for the current year.

We should consider what we spend on cable television, holidays, pets, dining out, sports events, vacations and so on. How do these compare with our giving for God's work?

We should ask ourselves if our Stewardship Commitment is serious and responsible before God. Is our gift a genuine response to the Lord: "Your Gifts, of what is Yours, we offer unto You."?

Offer your Stewardship each Sunday. Family members over 18 years of age, who are employed, should make their own Stewardship Commitment.

Participation in the Christian Stewardship Program allows each Greek Orthodox Steward to vote and to seek elective office in the administration of the parish as provided in the Archdiocesan and Parish Bylaws.

2012 STEWARDSHIP RESULTS

The Good News:

During 2012, the General Fund (the monies donated to operate the parish) had slightly more income than expenditures – clearly a desirable result. The major factors contributing to this success were that there were more members (individuals/couples who turned in their Membership/Stewardship Forms), and we also had higher total donations to the General Fund than ever before in the history of this parish.

The members who stated that they would donate to the Building Fund and the Iconography Fund were the largest ever. The amount that members said they would donate was the highest ever, and the amount that people said they would donate exceeded the most ever – those donating to the Iconography Fund donated 50% more than they said they would. The total amount donated to the Building Fund, the Iconography Fund and the pews actually exceeded what the parishioners donated to the General Fund!!!

The Bad News:

The number of members who gave what they promised they would give to the General Fund decreased in 2012 when compared to 2011. The members whose donations exceeded what they promised had a much lower average pledge in 2012 relative to 2011 and the percentage by which they exceeded their pledges also went down in 2012. The people who donated less then they promised gave a much smaller percentage in 2012 when compared to 2011. Finally, twenty-nine people who were members in 2011 did not become members in 2012 and donated nothing to the General Fund.

The Emerging Pattern:

The longtime members are beginning to shift their donations from the General Fund to the other Funds. If this pattern continues in 2013, we would be quite likely to experience a deficit in 2013. Now that the Parish Council has recommended that the parish effectively fund its ministries for the first time in 2013 and that the General Assembly endorsed this change during its meeting last fall, it is even more likely that the parish's General Fund will have a deficit at the end of 2013 if nothing is done to deal with this pattern of shifting donations.

RECOMMENDATION of the Stewardship Committee - What we all need to do in 2013:

We must commit ourselves to donate at least what we pledged to God for the Building and Iconography Funds and also <u>increase our donations to the General Fund in 2013</u>, thereby enabling the parish to fully fund its ministries as well as meet its annual budget.
