


#### **Directions to our Parish:**

#### Fr. Panapiotis' Message





As we enter a new year, this is a question we need to ask ourselves: What is the value of the Church to us? Why do we go to church? Why do we profess to be Orthodox Christians? Is this just a social connection, or is there more to it for us?

The Apostles, who established the first Church communities, following the "Great Commission of Christ" (Matt. 28:19-20), empowered by the Holy Spirit on Pentecost and equipped with both the "message" and personal conviction, stood bravely in front of tyrants and the learned men of the time preaching the power of Christ over death and His promise of eternal life. They moved from town to town proclaiming the "Good News" to all who would listen, baptizing those who would accept the "message" and teaching them how to observe those things which Christ had

commanded them. The Apostles established Christian communities which continued to proclaim the "Good News", adding more and more members to those who were being saved (Acts 2:42-47). For them, the Church was the vehicle of salvation for those who embraced "the new faith", "the new philosophy".

The main concern of the Apostles and the leaders of the Early Church was not the establishment of communities and activities for their members, but the salvation of human beings by bringing them to the Faith in the Risen Lord and attaching them to the Church (the Body of Christ). Their life as a community was simple, centered around the teaching and preaching of the words of Christ and the joining together in the "Agape Meals", the Eucharistic dinners where the more affluent brought food for everyone and they all shared in a meal before they received from the blessed bread and cup - the Body and Blood of Christ.

The Early Christians were characterized by the love they had for God and the affection and kindness they showed to each other. This dedication to God and others became a major factor in the growth of the Early Church; as people of the surrounding community witnessed the authentic love of these Christians, they joined the ranks of the Church as followers of Christ.

In the 21st century, at a time when Christianity is being marginalized, we have much to learn by looking at the Early Church. The Roman society, in which Christianity emerged was very similar to ours. People were self-centered and hedonistic. Their moral values were based on their desires. Yet, the Christians did not conform to that, but broke the norms, living as Christ taught.

Christians proposed a message contrary to many of the norms of their society. Yet, their message became attractive to the people who felt the pain and suffering of life, to those who were looking for the life beyond this temporary world, those asking for redemption from their sinful existence, those looking for forgiveness and peace.

The message of Christ remains the same. He still offers peace and forgiveness, redemption and eternal life. This is the purpose of the Church, to offer this opportunity to people seeking, to offer Christ Risen from the dead and His Kingdom, forgiveness, peace and love that are authentic.



The Orthodox Church has preserved the original Apostolic Faith pure and unblemished.

The Orthodox Church did not experience a reformation or counter reformation because the Faith was kept untouched by time and people. That does not mean all Orthodox people are always perfect, but that the Faith has remained perfect.

If the Orthodox Church in America is to succeed in its primary mission to bring the Gospel of Salvation and Sanctification to the world--we must continually return to the core Faith, to the prime theological teachings of the divinity of Christ and the salvation offered through Him.

We also need to establish our own schools where we will cultivate in our children the Orthodox Christian principles of life as the early Christians did. We cannot shape souls effectively unless we undertake a serious effort of immersion of our people from a young age in the Faith and Orthodox way of life. A serious Christian education is the way to do that. An Orthodox Christian education in particular is the only way to counter the intellectual onslaught of the secular society upon the minds of our people.

For years, as immigrants (Greeks, Russians, Serbs and others), we sought to establish ourselves as a respectable minority in America. We have succeeded and surpassed most other minorities. We now stand at a crossroads: we either continue to seek further political and societal acceptance through the use of the wealth God has given us, or we turn our focus to the greatest treasure we have, the ORTHODOX FAITH, and find ways to effectively share it with those around us.

We can either use our wealth to further impress the secular world with our successes so that we can continue to gain their respect and recognition, or we can seek ways to present the treasure of ancient Christianity that has been handed down to us by creating opportunities for theological education for those around us, especially those who are looking for authentic Christian teaching. Do we become anchored citizens of this world through our secular successes, or do we cultivate our citizenship in heaven through a witness of authentic Christian life?

This is a critical moment in the life of our Parish, as well. We have established ourselves by the grace of God as a respectable "faith group" in this corner of the earth. People are now ready to listen to us if we do have a serious message to offer. But we need to first understand what this message really is and make it an integral part of our own lives. As a group of people who claim to be followers of Christ, we need to begin living according to His teaching. People around us have to recognize us from our love for each other and our good works. We need to make a mark in the local community as both philanthropists as well as lovers of God. Then we will be able to make a difference in American Society, not through monetary wealth, but rather through the Wealth of the Orthodox Faith and Traditions that we have inherited.

#### GUIDELINES FOR RESPECTFUL WORSHIP

Probably the most important duty that we each have as worshippers attending church services is to do all that is in our power to see that a proper decorum and atmosphere is maintained so that all of the congregation is able to pray sincerely, peacefully and meaningfully.

It is with this fact in mind that we have set forth the following guidelines:

Upon entering the Church, at all times, but especially during services an individual should remember that he or she is in the House of God. Reverence and good manners are required so as not to disturb those who are already engaged in prayer, but, even more importantly, as an expression of sincere faith and awareness of the presence of the Lord. No irrelevant conversations should take place, either in the Narthex or in any part of the Church.

According to actual church service procedures, each and every member of the congregation is required to be seated in the pews at the beginning of the service. It is only by leniency that anyone is allowed to enter the Church once the services have begun. Thus it behooves us not to take undue advantage of this leniency.

There are several parts of the service during which no one should be moving about. Wherever a person happens to be at these moments, he or she should stop and stand reverently, until the proper time to proceed. These parts of the service are:



- The Procession of the Priest and Altar Boys with the Gospel;
- The reading of the Gospel;
- The Cherubic Hymn and the Great Procession of the Priest and Altar Boys with the Holy Gifts;
- The recitation of the Nicene Creed (in which the entire congregation should participate);
- The prayers of offering "Take, eat..." and the prayers of the consecration of the Holy Gifts;
- The Sermon;
- 7. Any special services (memorial services, processions, prayers).

One basic rule to follow is that, whenever the Priest is facing the people or outside of the altar, either with the censer or giving the blessing, everyone should stand wherever they are.

Please remember that the Parish Council members and the ushering staff are required to keep order during services, and all should follow their instructions at all times.





#### for reflection...





#### **HELLENIC DANCE FESTIVAL**

Hellenic Dance Festival (HDF) is upon us! Our parish will be represented by 2 groups this year; our young adult "Metamorphosi" group, and our high school group, "Eleftheria". We will have 15 dancers and 3 singers.

HDF - ORLANDO, FL - JANUARY 17-20, 2014

Metamorphosi will perform dances from Krete and Pontos.

Eleftheria will perform dances from Paros and the Southern Pindos Mountains of Central Greece.

What is HDF? This is a program dear to His Eminence's heart. In 2000, the first Greek folk dance festival took place with the goal of educating our youth about how our Orthodox faith and Hellenic culture intertwine, in hopes of preserving the traditions and customs of all Greeks throughout the world. Today, HDF hosts 19 communities all across the metropolis in a weekend of Faith, Folklore, and Fellowship. Dancers ranging in ages between 13-33 come together to perform traditional folk dances, sing hymns and visit with other youth from other communities.

How does HDF benefit our dancers? Greater understanding of the folk dances we have learned to perform. Another benefit is to improve the quality of the traditional shows for our Greek festivals. The biggest benefit is the eligibility for the Odyssey Scholarship.

What is the Odyssey Trip? The odyssey program is a 20 day pilgrimage back to Greece to focus on the faith by visiting and staying at area monasteries, learning the authentic presentation of Greek folk traditions at local dance schools and a quest to understand our ancestors. The metropolis offers 20 FULL scholarships and 5 land scholarships to the 25 most deserving youth. To be eligible for the Odyssey trip, you must participate in 2 out the prior 4 Hellenic Dance Festivals, be an active member in your local dance program and GOYA, receive a letter of recommendation from the parish and parish dance director, and create a research project to present to the selection committee.
