

Feasts of June



June 29 The Feast of the Apostles Peter and Paul


Peter was from Bethsaida of Galilee. He was the son of Jonas and the brother of Andrew the Firstcalled. He was a fisherman by trade, unlearned and poor, and was called Simon; later he was renamed Peter by the Lord Jesus Christ Himself, Who looked at him and said, "Thou art Simon the son of Jonas; thou shalt be called Cephas (which is by interpretation, Peter)" (John 1:42). On being raised by the Lord to the dignity of an Apostle and becoming inseparable from Him as His zealous disciple, he followed Him from the beginning of His preaching of salvation up until the very Passion, when, in the court of Caiaphas the high priest, he denied Him thrice because of his fear of the Jews and of the danger at hand. But again, after many bitter tears, he received complete forgiveness of his transgression. After the Resurrection of Christ and the descent of the Holy Spirit, he preached in Judea, Antioch, and certain parts of Asia, and finally came to Rome, where he was crucified upside down by Nero about the year 66 or 68, leaving two Catholic (Universal) Epistles to the Church of Christ and a legacy of faith.

Paul, the chosen vessel of Christ, the glory of the Church, the Apostle of the Nations and teacher of the whole world, was a Jew by race, of the tribe of Benjamin, having Tarsus as his homeland. He was a Roman citizen, fluent in the Greek language, an expert in knowledge of the Law, a Pharisee, born of a Pharisee, and a disciple of Gamaliel, a Pharisee and notable teacher of the Law in Jerusalem. For this cause, from the beginning, Paul was a most fervent zealot for the traditions of the Jews and a great persecutor of the Church of Christ; at that time, his name was Saul (Acts 22:3-4). In his great passion of rage and fury against the disciples of the Lord, he went to Damascus bearing letters of introduction from the high priest. His intention was to bring the disciples of Christ back to Jerusalem in bonds. As he was approaching Damascus, about midday there suddenly shone upon him a light from Heaven. Falling on the earth, he heard a voice saying to him, "Saul, Saul, why persecutest thou Me?" And he asked, "Who art Thou, Lord?" And the Lord said, "I am Jesus Whom thou persecutest; it is hard for thee to kick against the pricks." And that heavenly voice and brilliance made him tremble, and he was blinded for a time. He was led by the hand into the city, and on account of a divine revelation to the Apostle Ananias (see Oct. 1), he was baptized by him, and both his bodily and spiritual eyes were opened to the knowledge of the Sun of Righteousness. And straightway- O wondrous transformation! - beyond all expectation, he spoke with boldness in the synagogues, proclaiming that "Christ is the Son of God" (Acts 9:1-21). As for his zeal in preaching the Gospel after these things had come to pass, as for his unabating labors and afflictions of diverse kinds, the wounds, the prisons, the bonds, the beatings, the stonings, the shipwrecks.

Having completed the work of his ministry, Paul likewise ended his life in martyrdom when he was beheaded in Rome during the reign of Nero, at the same time, some say, when Peter was crucified.



STEWARDSHIP CORNER

Status of General Fund Stewardship as of May 24, 2014

The very good news continues – over half of the members have been donating ahead of what is expected for mid-May – typically about sixty percent ahead. Thus the parish has not experienced a cash-flow problem this year; thereby allowing all of the parish's bills to be paid on time.

However there are two concerns at this time: (1) many of the people who were members last year and/or were members in recent years have not yet submitted a Membership/Stewardship Form for 2014. Therefore, we are entering the summer months with only 309 individual and couples as members for this year.

(2) One-third of the members have not yet begun donating to the General Fund in 2014 or are significantly behind what they indicated they would be donating this year. Hopefully, these members will either begin donating one-seventh each month of the balance of what they said they would donate to the General Fund during 2014 (only seven months left in the year), or they will contact the parish office to reduce the amount that they think they will eventually donate to the General fund by the end of the year. If these members don't do either of these things, the parish could experience a General Fund deficit again this year.

The parish's fiscal success this year depends more on these latter 107 individuals and couples than any other factor. We pray that they will come to recognize God's continued blessing upon them and respond in a favorable fashion.

Serving the Disenfranchised in Romania by: Floyd Frantz



Poverty and lost hope for a decent life are the most difficult issues we deal with in Romania today. It is like a kid falling off a merry-go-round, but it is going around too fast for him to get back on. When someone in the States falls off the merry-go-round into poverty and disenfranchisement from the society, there are programs that help the person to get back up, to resolve their problems, to find work, and to re-enter the mainstream of society. Here in Romania, such programs are nearly nonexistent. Through OCMC and the Romanian Orthodox Church, Floyd and Ancuta Frantz are providing such opportunities for families and individuals facing very difficult life circumstances to lift themselves up and to reorganize and begin life in a new and meaningful way.

The Protection of the Theotokos Family Center (PTFC), managed by Ancuta Frantz, helps single mothers who are not able to care for their newborn children to find a way to live without abandoning the child to the Romanian state for care. The PTFC provides day-care service, job services, helps the families to find shelter when needed, gives the family food to help sustain them until the mother can be more independent, and provides personal counseling to the mother in both practical and spiritual venues.

The St. Dimitrie Program, managed by Floyd Frantz, offers addictions counseling and social services to the homeless and poor people living on the streets of Cluj, Romania. Hosting 12 Step meetings, the center also provides personal and spiritual counseling so that the person can find a way out of their difficult situations.

Serving the Youth in Moldova by: Leslie Hansard

I will be traveling to Moldova on July 14 and staying for two weeks to assist in hosting the 3rd annual Orthodox summer youth camp that focuses on religious education including Bible studies, sports, arts and crafts, and fellowship as well as the training of the camp counselors for a completely self-sustaining youth program for the future. I am incredibly excited to return once again to help and serve my Moldovan family!!

I am so incredibly thankful for the generosity that this parish has shown in raising the funds for this trip. It is through your unending love and support that I have raised more than enough to return to Moldova this summer. Please keep me and my team in your prayers as we serve the people of Moldova. Thank you so much and God bless!!

To: All Festival Volunteers,

Thank you so much to all of you who volunteered during our Marietta Greek Festival last month. Hopefully, I have seen most of you and thanked you personally. I would also like to thank those of you who recruited friends and neighbors from outside of our parish to help us during the Festival. Thank you to my Co-Chairman, Danny Vlahiotis, and Assistant Chairman, Mary Miltiades, for sharing the responsibility of preparing for and running the Festival with me. Also, thank you to the Festival Board and Festival Chairmen, whose hard work for months prior to the Festival was instrumental in our success. And, finally, thank you to Anne Willcocks, our Church secretary, for her time and dedication to our Festival and for always accommodating us in addition to her normal responsibilities.

Final attendance results for the weekend were approximately 10,000, a bit lower than expected due to the rain. Weekend revenues were \$220,318, which is a little higher than in 2013. These will be added to pre-Festival sales, Visitor's Guide revenues, post-Festival sales, ATM fees, etc. to get the total revenue for the Festival. We expect to close out our books by June 15th and will have final profit figures on or before July 15th.

I'm very proud of how our community, once again, came together for a common cause. We tried several new things this year, such as combining Greek Fries and Gyros, combining Greek Yogurt with the Kafenion, new location for Athena's Pita Grill, reconfiguring the Taverna and moving it back to its previous location under the pavilion, the purchase of new steam tables, professional sound system set-up, hiring assistance with Table Service, expanded Greek Heritage Exhibit, a new caricature artist, the use of iPads instead of cash registers, recycling of waste, an exit survey of our guests, etc. We received great feedback on these and other changes at our Post-Festival Meeting on June 10th. The general feeling was that some of these changes worked and some didn't or need tweaking. Nevertheless, we will continue to evaluate our Festival every year and adjust accordingly.

This is the time of year when our Festival leadership has a chance to rest. However, we need to also be thinking about the 2015 Festival. Specifically, we need more leaders to work under our 2015 Festival Chairman, Danny Vlahiotis. If you are willing to serve in a leadership capacity for next year's Festival, please call Anne at the church office, 770-924-8080, and let her know. She will relay the information to the appropriate person.

Thank you again for your efforts during our 2014 Marietta Greek Festival. The community can now look forward to another successful event in 2015.



'Christians in Turkey are second-class citizens', Deutsche Welle reports by Walter Flick

Turkey's small Christian population doesn't enjoy all the same rights as the Muslim majority. The Greek Orthodox Church has a particularly difficult relationship with the state, says religion expert Walter Flick.

The spiritual leader of the world's Orthodox Christians, Ecumenical Patriarch Batholomew of Constantinople, arrives to Germany May 10. During his nine-day visit, the 74-year-old will meet with state representatives including Chancellor Angela Merkel and President Joachim Gauck. He'll also be a guest of honor at major Christian churches, and receive an honorary doctorate from the University of Munich.

Bartholomew I has been the Ecumenical Patriarch of Constantinople, based in Istanbul, since November 1991. Orthodox Christians are a tiny minority in Turkey, and the population routinely faces discrimination. Walter Flick, a religious expert with the International Society for Human Rights in Germany, shares his insights on the situation in an interview with DW.

DW: Are Christians oppressed in Turkey?

Walter Flick: Turkey has almost 80 million inhabitants. There are only around 120,000 Christians, which is less than 1 percent of the population. Christians are certainly seen as second-class citizens. A real citizen is Muslim, and those who aren't Muslim are seen as suspicious. Christians aren't equal. You can't say they're being persecuted in Turkey, but they don't have the same rights, especially when it comes to religious freedom.

Is the position of Greek Orthodox Christians in Turkey even more difficult?

Yes, there are difficulties. When the Treaty of Lausanne was signed in 1923 - after the World War I and the Greco-Turkish War - Greek Orthodox Christians were given a special status allowing them to set up their own schools and institutions. But they don't have full rights. There are Greek Orthodox schools and newspapers in Istanbul, and there's a patriarchate. But the Halki seminary for Greek Orthodox theological education was closed in 1971 - and despite certain promises, it hasn't been reopened.

How can the patriarch fulfill his duties if the Turkish government doesn't like even his title?

He is the ecumenical patriarch of Constantinople, representing 300 million Orthodox Christians. But he's not been able to wield this title as he should - and this is a historic title that's been around since the 6th century! He isn't referred to as "Ecumenical Patriarch" within Turkey. The name is accepted overseas, but in Turkey he can't use that title, which was afforded by the European Convention on Human Rights.

The state has started confiscating real estate belonging to Greek Orthodox Christians. Many properties have been lost over the past few decades, for example office buildings, orphanages and other institutions. Of course that's touched a nerve with the church - the dwindling Greek Orthodox population in Turkey, about 5,000 people, depend on income from properties. If church members bequeath property, the church isn't able to easily receive it. In 2011, Prime Minister Erdogan promised return of expropriated real estate. Although that's been partly carried out, not all of it has been returned.

Bartholomew is regarded as a man of binding words and an outstretched hand. Does he have hope for fixing the problems his religious community is experiencing in Turkey?

I hope so. The opening of the Halki seminary is something that was promised decades ago. Then there have been law reforms announced, that for example private school law would be changed. But no dates have been given. Perhaps they will return everything next year, on the anniversary of the pogrom against Greeks in Turkey, in September 1955.

Turkey ordered to pay 90m euros over Cyprus invasion

Turkey must pay 90m euros (£73m; \$123m) in damages over its 1974 invasion of Cyprus, according to a decision by the European Court of Human Rights.

The judgement is one of the largest ever ordered by the court. It said the damages were compensation for losses endured during the invasion and in the subsequent partition.

Cyprus has been divided since 1974 when Turkey invaded the north in response to a military coup on the island which was backed by the government of Greece.

Since then, the northern third has been mainly inhabited by Turkish Cypriots and the southern two-thirds by Greek Cypriots.

Reunification push

In Monday's ruling, the European Court of Human Rights found that Turkey was still liable for damages, despite the passage of time. The court ruled that Turkey should pay 30m euros for the suffering endured by relatives of people who had gone missing during the invasion. It ordered Turkey to pay a further 60m euros for the suffering of Greek Cypriots who live in the Karpas peninsula - an enclave within northern Cyprus.

Turkey has not always complied with previous rulings by the body, Europe's top court of human rights.

Turkey still has around 30,000 troops stationed on the island, and it is the only country that recognises northern Cyprus as a separate entity.

UN peacekeeping forces estimate that 165,000 Greek Cypriots fled or were expelled from the north, and 45,000 Turkish Cypriots from the south, although the parties to the conflict say the figures are higher.

Greek and Turkish Cypriot leaders are engaged in a new round of talks aimed at reconciling differences and reuniting the island.

Christian Woman in Sudan sentenced to death for faith; 'I'm just praying,' husband says

(CNN) -- Hours after a Sudanese court sentenced his pregnant wife to death when she refused to recant her Christian faith, her husband told CNN he feels helpless.

"I'm so frustrated. I don't know what to do," Daniel Wani told CNN on Thursday. "I'm just praying."

His wife, Meriam Yehya Ibrahim, 27, was convicted by a Khartoum court this week of apostasy, or the renunciation of faith.

Ibrahim is Christian, her husband said. But the court considers her to be Muslim.

According to the rights group <u>Amnesty International</u>, she was also convicted of adultery and sentenced to 100 lashes because her marriage to a Christian man is considered void under Sharia law.

Her legal team says it plans to appeal the verdict, which drew swift condemnation from human rights organizations around the world. In the meantime, Ibrahim, who is eight months' pregnant, remains in prison with her 20-month-old son.

"She is very strong and very firm. She is very clear that she is a Christian and that she will get out one day," attorney Mohamed Jar Elnabi told CNN.

Ibrahim was born to a Sudanese Muslim father and an Ethiopian Orthodox mother. Her father left when she was 6 years old, and Ibrahim was raised by her mother as a Christian.

However, because her father was Muslim, the courts considered her to be the same, which would mean her marriage to a non-Muslim man is void.

The case, her lawyer said, started after Ibrahim's brother filed a complaint against her, alleging that she had gone missing for several years and that her family was shocked to find she had married a Christian man.

The court, which found her guilty earlier this week, gave her until Thursday to recant her Christian faith -- something she refused to do, according to her lawyer.

During Thursday's sentencing hearing, a sheikh told the court "how dangerous a crime like this is to Islam and the Islamic community," Elnabi said from Sudan.

Ibrahim responded, "I am a Christian and I will remain a Christian."
