



Fr. Panayiotis' Message

September 2017

WHO CAN I RELY ON DURING MY NEED?



The need for comfort and consolation arises in our lives sooner or later. That's when we call upon our family, our friends, our church community, our priest, looking for their presence, their love and their caring.

But more than anyone else, we should turn to God in our time of need, just as the Psalmist in the Old Testament did:

O LORD, I have trusted in you since I was young. I have leaned on you since birth (Psalm 71:5-6). Make haste, O God, to deliver me; make haste to help me, O LORD. (Psalm 70:1) You are my helper and my deliverer! O LORD, do not delay! (70:5)

This reliance on God is something I witnessed quite early in my own life. I watched my parents turn to God for help in everything. I remember my mother praying at every turn of the day about all things and for all of our needs. We didn't have much (by modern American standards), but we never lacked anything and never feared that we ever would.

And then, the test of time came: The Turkish invasion of Cyprus and our uprooting from our homes and ancestral land. This was the time when the words of the Psalmist made a lot more sense. This is when all the training in prayer of the years past came in handy. We had no one to turn to because everyone we knew was also uprooted and fleeing for their lives. God was our only consolation. He was our only source of strength. The prayer "make haste, O God, to deliver us; make haste to help us, O Lord," became a constant offering from our lips.

Great strength comes to those who learn to turn to God early on in their lives. They learn not to rely on their own abilities alone but rather on the power and protection of God that always hovers over them. They become humble as they realize that "all good things come from above" and nothing can be taken for granted.

Here, at Holy Transfiguration, we have had many blessings over the last 29 years of the life of the parish. God's abundant Grace has been poured over us. Perhaps we don't feel the need to ask for His deliverance from anything right now, but we still need to teach the younger generations to rely on the Lord. Training the youth to pray and depend on God will help them find the strength, wisdom and guidance in their life when the need arises, when the test of time arrives. Teaching them to trust in God will give them patience and comfort when they find themselves in trouble. It will help pull them out of any difficulty, no matter how grave.

Please bring your children to church **on time** for the services. Please help them learn to immerse themselves in prayer. Please teach them humility and reliance on God. I assure you that you will live to see and enjoy the benefits!!!


The Birth of the Virgin Mary the Blessed Theotokos Celebrated on September 8

Celebrated on September 14


On September 14th, Orthodox Christians throughout the world commemorate the Elevation of the Precious and Life-Giving Cross.

This feast commemorates the discovery of the Holy Cross of Christ by St. Helena in 325 A.D. and also the recovery of it in 628 A.D. by Emperor Heraclius after it was stolen by the Persians when they plundered Jerusalem in 614.

This is a very solemn day as we remember the sacrifice of the Lord for us. This is why we keep a **strict fast on this day**. This is the second most solemn day of the Church calendar after Holy Friday.

"Lord, save Your people and bless Your inheritance, granting our rulers to prevail over adversaries, and protecting Your commonwealth by Your Cross."




The Elevation of the Precious and Life-Giving Cross

The Falling Asleep of St. John the Evangelist and Theologian

Commemorated on September 26

This Apostle John was from Bethsaida of Galilee, and was the son of Zebedee and Salome, the brother of James the elder and the nephew of our Savior, since his mother was the daughter of St Joseph the Betrothed. First a fisherman by trade. he became an Apostle and the beloved Disciple of Christ. The behavior of the two brothers, John and James, revealed their fiery nature, strong zeal and great faith for which they earned the name from Christ "Boanerges" that is "Sons of Thunder" (Mark 3:17). Only John of all the disciples followed Christ even to the Cross, and was entrusted with the care of our Savior's Mother. After this, he preached throughout Asia Minor. especially in Ephesus. When the second persecution against the Christians began in the year 96 during the reign of Domitian, he was taken in bonds to Rome, and there was cast into a vat filled with boiling oil. Emerging unharmed, he was then exiled to the island of Patmos,



where he wrote the Book of Revelation. He returned again to Ephesus after the death of the tyrant, and wrote his Gospel (after the other Evangelists had already written theirs) and his three Epistles. He instructed the Christians to guard against false teachers and their erroneous teachings. He called for all Christians to love the Lord and one another, and by this to fulfill the commands of Christ. The Church calls St John the "Apostle of Love", since he constantly taught that without love man cannot come near to God. When he was well advanced in years he used to be carried to the gatherings of the believers and only gave them very short sermons saying, "My children, love one another."

When it was time for his departure, he went out beyond the city limits of Ephesus with his disciples and their families. He bade them prepare for him a cross-shaped grave telling his disciples that they should cover him over with the soil. The disciples tearfully kissed their beloved teacher, and not wanting to be disobedient, they fulfilled his bidding. They covered the face of the saint with a cloth and filled in the grave. Learning of this, other disciples of St John came to the place of his burial, but when they opened the grave, they found it empty. In all, he lived ninety five years and fell asleep in the Lord during the reign of Trajan in the year 100.

He was called the Theologian because he loftily expounded in his Gospel the theology of the inexpressible and eternal birth of the Son of the Word of God the Father. An eagle is depicted in his icon, for it is the symbol of the lofty heights of his theological thought and is one of the four symbolic living creatures that the Prophet Ezekiel saw (Ezek. 1:10).

Beloved Apostle of Christ our God, hasten to deliver a people without defense. He who permitted you to recline upon His bosom, accepts you on bended knee before Him. Beseech Him, O Theologian, to dispel the persistent cloud of nations, asking for us peace and great mercy.


Robin-Darling Young

The Orthodox Church has preserved the original Apostolic Faith pure and unblemished. The Orthodox Church did not experience a reformation or counter reformation because the Faith was kept untouched by time and people. That does not mean all Orthodox people are always perfect, but that the Faith has remained perfect.

If the Orthodox Church in America is to succeed in its primary mission to bring the Gospel of Salvation and Sanctification to the world--we must continually return to the core Faith, to the prime theological teachings of the divinity of Christ and the salvation offered through Him.

We also need to establish our own schools where we will cultivate in our children the Orthodox Christian principles of life as the early Christians did. We cannot shape souls effectively unless we undertake a serious effort of immersion of our people from a young age in the Faith and Orthodox way of life. A serious Christian education is the way to do that. An Orthodox Christian education in particular is the only way to counter the intellectual onslaught of the secular society upon the minds of our people.

For years, as immigrants (Greeks, Russians, Serbs and others), we sought to establish ourselves as a respectable minority in America. We have succeeded and surpassed most other minorities. We now stand at a crossroads: we either continue to seek further political and societal acceptance through the use of the wealth God has given us, or we turn our focus to the greatest treasure we have, the ORTHODOX FAITH, and find ways to effectively share it with those around us.

We can either use our wealth to further impress the secular world with our successes so that we can continue to gain their respect and recognition, or we can seek ways to present the treasure of ancient Christianity that has been handed down to us by creating opportunities for theological education for those around us, especially those who are looking for authentic Christian teaching. Do we become anchored citizens of this world through our secular successes, or do we cultivate our citizenship in heaven through a witness of authentic Christian life?

This is a critical moment in the life of our Parish, as well. We have established ourselves by the grace of God as a respectable "faith group" in this corner of the earth. People are now ready to listen to us if we do have a serious message to offer. But we need to first understand what this message really is and make it an integral part of our own lives. As a group of people who claim to be followers of Christ, we need to begin living according to His teaching. People around us have to recognize us from our love for each other and our good works. We need to make a mark in the local community as both philanthropists as well as lovers of God. Then we will be able to make a difference in American Society, not through monetary wealth, but rather through the Wealth of the Orthodox Faith and Traditions that we have inherited.

Let's become Ambassadors of Orthodox Christianity, the Ancient Faith, the Faith of the Apostles!

You Are a Member of the Church? Are you a Steward also?

A question always asked by our parishioners is "How can I be a member of the Parish? I am already an Orthodox Christian. Isn't that enough?

The answer to this is very simple: All people baptized and chrismated (confirmed) in the Orthodox Church are automatically members of the Church, but it takes a little more to be "members in good standing" in the Orthodox Church and in the Parish. First, it is required that a person be married in the Church and live his/her life as an Orthodox Christian, participating in the Holy Sacraments, in order to be in good standing within the Orthodox Church. If one has been married outside the Orthodox Church or has gone through a civil divorce and has not obtained a Church divorce, he/she may not be in good standing with the Church. Please check with the priest of the parish in order to find out where you are.

How can one be a member of the Parish?

It takes participation in the parish by supporting the operation and ministries of the parish to be a member in good standing. In order to do that, you have to fill out the Membership/Stewardship Form and indicate on it how you are going to participate in the Parish with your Time, Talents and Treasure. When you join the Parish in this way, you make a Pledge to God that you will support the work of the Church with the gifts He has given you so that the Gospel may be preached and people may be saved through the ministries of the Church. **Please join us at Holy Transfiguration and serve God with us!**

WHAT IS THE PRIMARY PURPOSE OF THE PARISH'S STEWARDSHIP MINISTRY?

Most of the parishioners seem to think that the primary purpose of the Stewardship Ministry is to collect money for the operation of the parish. <u>However that is not what Stewardship is about</u> – the collection of funds is a secondary purpose of stewardship.

Stewardship is about our relationship with God and our desire to connect with Him. It is about our Love for God and His work of Salvation. It is about our salvation and the salvation others.

Stewardship is also about our sharing of what God has given us to spread the Gospel and help others to come to Him. We do this by donating our time and talents to serve His Church, but we also donate money to support the ministries of the Church for the salvation of all. Our Stewardship enables the Local as well as the Universal Church to do the work of salvation.

The Necessity of Stewardship

Our Parish depends on the Stewardship of its members. Our Parish is funded by us.

Let us offer to our Parish from the Gifts of God to us. Let us offer in proportion of His Gifts to us. Let us bring our offering with a joyful heart.

You will be Blessed greatly if you support the work of our Parish and the work of His Church.

Question Concerning Stewardship

I have been asked many times why people do not respond quickly in filling out and returning their Stewardship Forms to the parish. As I pondered the question over time I have come up with four main reasons:

1. Many of our parishioners (even long-time members) tend to be procrastinators.

2. Others do not understand or refuse to accept that everything we have is a gift from God and we are merely stewards of His gifts on earth. Hence, they do not like to make a commitment to the work of the Lord until they need the church and her services.

3. Still others consider the Stewardship Form as a Pledge Card and hesitate to "pledge" out of fear that the church may demand from them what they have pledged if they are unable to fulfill this pledge.

4. And yet there are others who do not feel the close affiliation with the parish for reasons that may vary from case to case and stand back again until they need the services of the church.

All of the above situations can be rectified if the active core parishioners show more interest in helping all people who belong in the above four groups to become comfortable in the parish and overcome their specific difficulty.

1. We should gently and lovingly remind the procrastinators to step forward and return their Stewardship form by explaining again and again the need to do so for the welfare of the parish and its ministries.

We should kindly and lovingly explain the concept of Stewardship to those who do not understand it yet.
 We should patiently and lovingly disperse the notion of "pledge" obligation from the minds of those who

think that way and reassure them that no-one has ever been chased by the parish for his inability to fulfill their "faith estimate" they put on their Stewardship Form.

4. We should witness the true love of Christ to those who stand on the sidelines and embrace them as Christian brothers and sisters so that they may realize that they belong within the Christian family and join in.

Purpose and Meaning of Free-Will Offerings


Some people may wonder whether a *free-will offering* means that the event or item being offered is free. Of course, there is a major difference between "free" and "free will".

Candles are a classic case of *free-will offering*: When we enter the Narthex of our church, even though there is no sign, we all know that the candles we light are not free. We place an offering in the basket because the candle is burned as an offering to God from us. We cannot place the responsibility of the purchase of this candle on someone else. It is our own offering, so we offer whatever we feel appropriate at that point.

Our parish organizes many events, e.g., coffee hours, luncheons, special dinners with a *free-will offering* request. There are two reasons for doing so:

- The parish leadership decided that these events should not be used as fundraisers because we know that when we "nickel and dime" the parishioners through many fundraisers they in turn are unwilling or unable to support properly the Operational Fund (General Fund) of the parish. We, hence, request that each person offer whatever they are willing and able at these *free-will offering* events.
- From both the Old and New Testaments we learn that God wants us to practice 'proportional giving' "The more a person is blessed with, the more he is expected to offer back for God's work."

Thus, a *free-will offering* request from the parish allows a person with a higher income to donate much more for a luncheon than a person who depends on his/hers Social Security check and/or small pension. It also allows a family with four or five children to stay for a luncheon by donating whatever they are able to per person rather than having to pay a fixed higher price. In summary, *free-will offerings* allow everyone to participate in every parish event without putting a financial stress on the family.







Parish Life Center & Kitchen Use – Reminders and Tips

Our church family has been blessed with awesome gathering spaces and kitchen facilities. It is important to remember that we are all responsible for the upkeep and maintenance of these facilities.

Although there is a professional cleaning service that comes in twice a week, there is no paid staff to tidy up after us. We are ALL responsible for making sure the facilities are left clean and in good shape for the next group to use. Your fellow parishioners would be grateful if we could all be mindful of our shared spaces and pay attention to the following:

- 1) You are welcome to use the paper supplies and kitchen equipment, however, please return clean or unused items to the appropriate area. This will help with maintaining and controlling inventory.
- 2) Use the shopping list whiteboard (located on the kitchen pantry closet) if you see that we are running low on any item so that we can replenish. Michael Gavalas is responsible for re-ordering kitchen & bathroom supplies.
- 3) If you are storing food items for an event, we ask that you label these items for the event or ministry and store for no more than 1 week ahead of the event.
- 4) Please do not leave leftover food or drink in the refrigerators after an event. There is no one to throw it out. It will go to waste and, worse yet, spoil and smell.
- 5) Make sure to wipe down all tables after use and re-arrange tables and chairs as necessary.

A book that we are talking about this month is "Icon, A Novel" by Georgia Briggs. Check out the review by Bev Cooke (from Behind the Scenes, Ancient Faith Ministries blog) reprinted below.

There are times when a book feels so right and so true that it takes a place not just in your heart, but insinuates itself into your entire being. That is *Icon: A Novel*, by <u>Georgia Briggs</u>.

One of the major attractions of the book was how normal and thrilling it felt to be reading a book of fiction and seeing little pieces of my life in it. I can read about Orthodox lives and people, yes, but the books are generally from another nation and another time – and in the day-to-day lives of the book's characters, there is little that resonates with my cultural touchstones and routines. I can read secular fiction and feel at home in the secular world the characters inhabit – I know the books they read, I'm familiar with the TV shows and top ten songs on the radio, but even if religion is mentioned, it's not MY faith and that faith doesn't intersect the everyday world of the characters the way our faith intersects our everyday lives. In *Icon*, I not only get the references to Lois Lowry's *The Giver*, and*Speak* by Laurie Halse Anderson, and the references to MacDonalds and Egg McMuffins, and to the secular Christmas that we all complain about every year, but, joy of joys, I get the references to fasting and how good meat tastes on Pascha. When the hymns are sung, I hear the melodies in my head, because I sing those at Liturgy, too! It felt as though finally, someone saw the world the way I did, and wrote about it. It felt like my world, my reality, my life.

That was the tip of the iceberg. Then it got better.

On one level, *Icon* can be read as a mid-grade/young adult dystopian novel. It's slightly futuristic (but at the same time, it feels very much a story of right here and right now), with an all-too-plausible premise in which our current culture combines the worst of that "feel good, be tolerant and accepting of everything" mentality with the equally strong intolerance and suspicion of the "other," with predictable results. As long as you're completely secular and keep your religion so private nobody knows about it, you're fine. Those who insist on believing, who stand apart from the bland lip service of "acceptance" and "tolerance," are sacrificed on the altar of that intolerant tolerance.

It's the combination of the two cultures – secular and Orthodox – that is part of the strength and the power of this book. Euphrosyne, or Hillary as she is called in the new world order, is off balance and isn't sure what is truth and what are lies. All she knows is that in one horrific moment, she lost her family and her reality, and the rest of the book is her groping to find or return to something true and real.

This book brings home, in a visceral way, the experience of today's martyrs. By marrying the reality of our lives in our culture with the slightly futuristic world in which religion is the only sin, *Icon* makes the modern Christian persecution real in a way none of the pictures on TV and social media can. We can see the images, watch the videos, and agonize as our brothers and sisters in faith are blown up, gunned down, and beheaded because they will not proclaim Allah, they will not burn the incense, and they will not say all religions are a private and personal matter, to be kept only in our minds and hearts and never shared with anyone. But Georgia brings the pain, the blood, and the sacrifice home to us, to our neighborhoods and to our living rooms: from the broken figure of Jesus in a thrown-away Christmas creche to a hurried and paranoid Paschal breakfast in a MacDonald's drive-through, while covered in the blood of your martyred family.

And it got deeper, and still more compelling.

On another level, this book is about being an icon of Christ, of standing as firm as the hardwood upon which our icons are written. It's about being the salt and the beacon, even if we aren't aware that's what we're doing. It's about seeing that saints are made of the same stuff we are, and are as weak, as doubting, and as broken as every single one of us, and that sometimes, what makes a saint isn't their incredible faith and strength, but their confusion, their doubt and their stumbling through the dark toward a distant, faint light with no assurance that it's not just another train barreling down the tracks toward them.

I don't think this book could have been written by anyone but an Orthodox Christian. The power and strength of *Icon* is the effortless way Georgia Briggs combines all three of those threads: the culture of our faith with secular culture and the power and true meaning of an icon. The cultural clashes could be done by anyone. It's just a matter of knowing a religious culture and a secular culture. Plenty of people know that. But it's only the Orthodox who understand what those wooden paintings really mean, and what stands behind each and every one of them. And it's the combination of those three threads that gives *Icon* the strength and the power it has to not just take a place in your heart, but to insinuate itself into the very fiber of your being. This is not a book that can be forgotten easily. It's a book that will widen and deepen your world.
