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
Directions to our Parish:

Fr. Panayiotis' Message

Is there such a thing as Orthodox Culture?



The answer to the question of the existence of Orthodox Culture is not only a strong affirmative one, but also historically rooted in the formation of the Early Christian community.

So, what is, then, Orthodox Culture and where does it come from? How was it established and what effect has it had on people over the centuries?

Clearly, Christianity has it's roots in first century Judaism. The early Christians were Jews who recognized their Messiah in the person of Jesus Christ. They continued to practice their Judaic traditions until the Temple of Jerusalem was destroyed in 70 AD.

After the destruction of the Temple and their expulsion from the Jewish synagogues (around the years 95-98 AD) on account of

their influence on the rest of the members of the synagogue - converting them to the crucified and risen Jesus Christ - these early Jewish Christians had to develop their own practices apart from the rest of the Jews. Hence, we see the beginning of a new culture, rooted in Judaism (various traditions and practices, especially the Ten Commandments), but further informed and shaped by the "Good News" of the Messiah who had revealed salvation in a new way, elevating those who would follow His teaching to new heights of spiritual existence. Christians were asked to live under a new commandment; to love God with all their heart and mind, to love one another, to even love their enemies, to acquire purity of heart through meekness, control of their lusts and vices and a complete trust and surrender to God's mercy and loving care. New culture was being created based on the teachings of Jesus Christ.

Baptism in the name of the "Father, Son and Holy Spirit" was now the door into this new illumination and life. Regularly partaking of the Gifts, which the Lord Jesus Christ left them through His words at the Last Supper, His Body and Blood, becomes now the center of their gatherings (the Eucharist), where the sacrifice is now bloodless, since the Lamb of God was sacrificed once and for all. People approached the Holy Eucharist as the antidote to death and the door to eternal life. The expectation of eternal life, a better existence beyond the sufferings of the present one provided hope then and continues to do so for those who realize how transient and fleeting this world is. The spiritual power provided by surrendering to Christ as the Savior provides the ability to transcend the difficulties of this life.

The central event of Christianity becomes now the new Passover - Pascha, the Resurrection of the Lord. Forty days of fasting and self-denial are established as the path to the Passion of the Lord, a return to the Garden of Eden, a new ascend to the top of Mount Sinai, where God is now fully revealed in the person of the Risen Lord, shining His Light in the World. Like the ascend of Moses of old, the primary goal of this Lenten period is for the human passions to be reigned in, for the Christian to gain control over his/her sinful urges and manage to offer himself to God purified from desires and sins through fasting, confession, prayer and almsgiving so that he may encounter the Lord on the summit. The encounter transforms the person, lifts him/her up for the worldly to the heavenly. It provides, joy, hope and love beyond human understanding.

The ancient Psalms continued to be used to sing glory to God, but new prayers and hymns were also developed to express the new truths, which Christ had revealed. New music was now added to the hymns to make Christian gatherings beautiful to the ear. Incense, just as in the old Jewish worship, was also used to bring fragrance to the space through the sense of smell, signifying also the prayers of the faithful rising up to God. The daily worship cycle continued to begin at sunset, but the Sabbath was now moved to reflect the centrality of the Resurrection to the "first day of the week", the new Sabbath, which was now renamed as "the Lord's Day", the Day of the New Creation. The worship cycle of the year also moved on from the ancient Jewish feasts (which were now seen as prefigurations of the events of Christ's life) to reflect the New Revelation of the life, teachings and miracles of the Messiah - everything always centered on the Primary Event, the Resurrection and transformation of humanity in Christ.

As people died in the persecutions, they were declared martyrs, witnesses to the new way of life of the Kingdom of God which is already present in us. The days of their martyrdom became signposts of salvation, birthdays into the Kingdom of God, and were placed on the calendar. People visited their tombs and remembered their lives and sacrifice drawing their witness for strength and courage to fight the good fight. The culture of the veneration of the martyrs and saints was established.

Beautiful paintings depicting the life and miracles of Jesus were introduced to beautify the worship space, but also as teaching tools for those who could not read the Holy Scriptures. The culture of the veneration of the Holy Icons was established.

Christians remembered the words of the Lord to the Samaritan woman that God is Spirit and can be worshipped everywhere. Hence, beautiful buildings (Naoí - Temples) began to appear everywhere as replacements of the Jewish Temple. These buildings were dedicated and consecrated following the ancient Jewish practice as found in the Old Testament and a culture of sanctification of the places of Christian worship was established. The relics of the martyrs were placed in the holy altars to continually remind Christians that the Church, founded on Christ was being nourished and strengthened by the witness of those who loved Him much and sacrificed their earthly lives so that they may become partakers of the Divine Life.

Controversies with regard to the expression of the Faith arose. This gave the leaders of the Church the opportunity to develop a process of dealing with conflicts. The culture of the Local as well as the Ecumenical Councils was formed. Tremendous theological treatises were written. The Faith was being slowly further clarified as the Holy Fathers, inspired by their faith in the Risen Lord and the power of the Holy Spirit dealt with both theological as well as disciplinary issues. The Creed of Faith was formulated, the books of the New Testament were sorted out, the Holy Canons, dealing with governance and moral behaviors, were established.

During the fourth and fifth centuries (after its liberation from persecutions) Christianity became a significant force, which slowly transformed the cruel and lustful Greco-Roman society to a gentler, more peace-loving culture than any previous one in the history of humanity. The teachings of Christ about human behavior, as found in the Holy Scriptures of the New Revelation (the New Testament), were slowly implemented as laws by the new Christian Roman Empire. This Empire (known today as the Byzantine Empire) lasted for over a thousand years, providing in its embrace the experience of the Kingdom of God on

earth within the culture and traditions of the Orthodox Church. It is this same culture that we have inherited. It is this same culture that can transform us today, as well, if we enter and embrace it.

The Transfiguration of our Lord on Mount Tabor

Celebrated on August 6


Hymn of the Feast

Apolytikion of the feast (Grave Tone)

"You were transfigured upon the mountain, O Christ our God, showing to Your disciples, Your glory as much as they could bear. Do also in us, sinners though we may be, shine Your everlasting light, by the intercessions of the Theotokos, O Giver of Light, glory to You."

Commentary:

Our Lord had spoken to His disciples many times not only concerning His Passion, Cross, and Death, but also concerning the coming persecutions and afflictions that they themselves would endure. Since all these evils were near at hand, but the enjoyment of good things which they hoped to receive in their stead was yet to come, our Savior desired to give them full assurance, evidently and openly, concerning that glory which is prepared for those who endure to the end. Therefore, fulfilling that



which He had promised shortly before, that "there be some standing here which shall not taste of death, till they see the Son of man coming in His Kingdom" (Matt. 16:28), He took His three foremost disciples and ascended Mount Tabor, where He was transfigured before them. His face shone like the sun, and His clothes became white as the light. Suddenly, together with this dread and marvelous effulgence of light, there appeared those pinnacles of the Prophets, Moses and Elias, who spoke with the Lord Jesus concerning His saving Passion which was about to take place. Standing before Him as reverent servants, they showed that He is the Lord of both the living and the dead, for Moses came forth from Hades, having died many centuries before, and Elias, as it were from heaven, whither he had been taken up while yet alive. After a little while a radiant cloud overshadowed them and out of the cloud they heard that same voice which had been heard at the Jordan at the Baptism of Christ, testifying to the Divinity of Jesus and saying: "This is My beloved Son, in Whom I am well-pleased; hear ye Him" (Matt. 17: 5).

Such are the marvels, truly worthy of God, celebrated in this present feast, which is an image and prefiguring of the future state of the righteous, whose splendor the Lord spoke of, saying: "Then shall the righteous shine forth as the sun" (Matt. 13:43). It is because of this that the Kontakion of this Feast is said daily (when there is not a great feast) in the Service of the Typica in perpetual commemoration of the glory that will be the lot of the Saints. According to tradition, the Lord's Transfiguration came to pass forty days before His Crucifixion; this is why the Transfiguration is celebrated forty days before the Exaltation of the Cross.

From the Lity. Tone Plagal of the First Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit.


Come, O gathering of those who love to keep the feasts, come and let us form a choir. Come, let us crown the Church with songs, as the Ark of God goes to her rest. For today is heaven opened wide as it receives the Mother of Him who cannot be contained. The earth, as it yields up the Source of life, is robed in blessing and majesty. The hosts of angels, present with the fellowship of the apostles, gaze in great fear at her who bore the Cause of life, now that she is translated from life to life. Let us all venerate and implore her: Forget not, O Lady, your ties of kinship with those who commemorate in faith the feast of your all-holy Dormition.

Sing, O ye people, sing ye the praises of the Mother of our God: for today she delivers her soul, full of light, into the immaculate hands of Him who was made incarnate of her without seed. And she entreats Him without ceasing to grant the inhabited earth peace and great mercy.

From the Aposticha. Fourth Tone.

Come, O ye people, and let us sing the praises of the pure and most holy Virgin, from whom the Word of the Father ineffably came forth incarnate. Let us cry aloud and say: Blessed are you among women and blessed is your womb that held Christ. Having delivered your soul into His holy hands, do you, O most pure, entreat Him for the salvation of our souls.



From the Aposticha.

Tone Plagal of the 4th (by Sergios of the Holy City) Glory to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit, now and ever and unto ages of ages. Amen.

At your departing, O Virgin Theotokos, to Him who was ineffably born of you, James the first bishop and brother of the Lord was there, and so was Peter, the honored leader and chief of the disciples, and the whole sacred fellowship of the apostles. In discourses that showed forth heavenly things they sang the praises of the divine and amazing mystery of the dispensation of Christ our God; and they rejoiced, O far-famed Virgin, as they buried your body, the origin of the Life and holder of God. On high the most holy and venerable of the angelic powers bowed in wonder before this marvel, and said one to another: 'Open wide your gates and receive her who bore the Creator of heaven and earth. With songs of praise let us glorify her precious and holy body, dwellingplace of the Lord on whom we may not gaze.' Therefore we too, as we keep your feast, cry out to you, O far-famed Lady: Raise up the Christian horn and save our souls.

Saint Kosmas Aitolos, the New Hieromartyr and Equal-to-the-Apostles (+1779) August 24th



Saint Kosmas the Aitolian, or Patrokosmas, as he is called, is a figure in both church and national history who in the 18th century cast his light upon the path which the Greeks would follow a little before the outbreak of the Struggle for Liberation. He was the son of devout parents who brought him up accordingly, and he came from the village of Mega Dendron in Aitolia.

His aptitude for learning took him to the school run by the Vatopedi Monastery on the Holy Mountain, where he studied under teachers famed for their learning. When the Athonite Academy fell into decay, the young Kostas (his name in the world) went to the Philotheou Monastery. There he was tonsured a monk and given the name of Kosmas and zealously engaged in many ascetic practices. At the request of the fathers of the Monastery, he was ordained a priest.

St. Kosmas had a burning desire to be of service to his brothers in Christ who were suffering so many hardships. The enslavement of many years with the subsequent degradation of life, ignorance, and the decline into barbarity in behaviour were the scourges of the mass of Christians. The reflections of St. Kosmas on this situation led him to go out to the people and begin a series of preaching tours. As his thoughts matured, with the permission of the fathers of the Monastery, around 1760 he left for Constantinople, where he received the blessing of the Patriarch Seraphim II.


St. Kosmas began his preaching from the enslaved Capital itself. He then went to Nafpaktos, Mesolonghi, and other areas, returning to Constantinople in 1774. With the permission of the new Patriarch Sophronius II, the Saint resumed his apostolic task. He returned for a little while to Athos, but his love for the Church's flock led his steps to Thessaloniki, Veria, and other parts of Macedonia. From there, he moved on to Acarnania and Aitolia, as far as Arta and Preveza.

Because of the large crowds which followed him, the Saint used to preach on open plains, always with the permission of the local bishop and aga (local Turkish official). His words were simple, but filled with the Holy Spirit. It was his custom wherever he was going to preach to tell the people to construct a wooden cross. He would then place a stool which he carried with him against the cross and preach standing upon it. The cross would remain as a reminder of his preaching. (cont.-->)

The Saint urged the Christians to build schools so that their children could learn about the Faith and be well-grounded in Christian piety. He would speak to them about the services of the Church, explain to them the value of repentance and confession, warning them against sin and urging them to lead lives of goodness.

As with the Apostles, St. Kosmas' preaching was often confirmed by miraculous signs. The Saint was admired and even feared by many Turks, and hated by many Jews. They spread unfounded accusations against him and slandered him to Kurt Pasha, to whom they offered money if he would put St. Kosmas to death. Kurt Pasha conspired with the hodja of the village of Kolikontasi in Albania that a trap would be set for St. Kosmas. On the pretext that the Pasha wished to see him, they took the Saint to a remote spot and hung him on August 24th, 1779. His murderers stripped the sanctified body of the Saint, tied a stone to it, and threw it into the river. The local Christians looked for his corpse, but could not find it. In a miraculous manner it rose to the surface and was pulled out by Papa Markos, the priest of the All-Holy Theotokos of the Presentation Monastery, which is near Kolikontasi, and buried it at the back of the sanctuary. Many other miracles followed the martyr's death of the Saint, and he was quickly established in the mind of the people not only as a martyr but as a true apostle.

The Beheading of St. John the Forerunner and Baptist

Celebrated on August 29
Hymn of the Feast

Apolytikion of the feast (Second Tone)

The memory of the just is celebrated with hymns of praise, but the Lord's testimony is sufficient for thee, O Forerunner; for thou hast proved to be truly even more venerable than the Prophets, since thou was granted to baptize in the running waters Him Whom they proclaimed. Wherefore, having contested for the truth, thou didst rejoice to announce the good tidings even to those in Hades: that God hath appeared in the flesh, taking away the sin of the world and granting us great mercy.

Commentary: The divine Baptist, the Prophet born of a Prophet, the seal of all the Prophets and beginning of the Apostles, the mediator between the Old and New Covenants, the voice of one crying in the wilderness, the God-sent Messenger of the incarnate Messiah, the forerunner of Christ's coming into the world (Esaias 40: 3; Mal. 3: 1); who by many miracles was both conceived and born; who was filled with the Holy Spirit while yet in his mother's womb; who came forth like another Elias the



Zealot, whose life in the wilderness and divine zeal for God's Law he imitated: this divine Prophet, after he had preached the baptism of repentance according to God's command; had taught men of low rank and high how they must order their lives; had admonished those whom he baptized and had filled them with the fear of God, teaching them that no one is able to escape the wrath to come if he do not works worthy of repentance; had, through such preaching, prepared their hearts to receive the evangelical teachings of the Savior; and finally, after he had pointed out to the people the very Savior, and said, "Behold the Lamb of God, Which taketh away the sin of the world" (Luke 3:2-18; John 1: 29-36), after all this, John sealed with his own blood the truth of his words and was made a sacred victim for the divine Law at the hands of a transgressor.

This was Herod Antipas, the Tetrarch of Galilee, the son of Herod the Great. This man had a lawful wife, the daughter of Arethas (or Aretas), the King of Arabia (that is, Arabia Petraea, which had the famous Nabatean stone city of Petra as its capital. This is the Aretas mentioned by Saint Paul in II Cor. 11:32). Without any cause, and against every commandment of the Law, he put her away and took to himself Herodias, the wife of his deceased brother Philip, to whom Herodias had borne a daughter, Salome. He would not desist from this unlawful union even when John, the preacher of repentance, the bold and austere accuser of the lawless, censured him and told him, "It is not lawful for thee to have thy brother's wife" (Mark 6: 18). Thus Herod, besides his other unholy acts, added yet this, that he apprehended John and shut him in prison; and perhaps he would have killed him straightway, had he not feared the people, who had extreme reverence for John. Certainly, in the beginning, he himself had great reverence for this just and holy man. But finally, being pierced with the sting of a mad lust for the woman Herodias, he laid his defiled hands on the teacher of purity on the very day he was celebrating his birthday. When Salome, Herodias' daughter, had danced in order to please him and those who were supping with him, he promised her -- with an oath more foolish than any foolishness -- that he would give her anything she asked, even unto the half of his kingdom. And she, consulting with her mother, straightway asked for the head of John the Baptist in a charger. Hence this transgressor of the Law, preferring his lawless oath above the precepts of the Law, fulfilled this godless promise and filled his loathsome banquet with the blood of the Prophet. So it was that that all-venerable head, revered by the Angels, was given as a prize for an abominable dance, and became the plaything of the dissolute daughter of a debauched mother. As for the body of the divine Baptist, it was taken up by his disciples and placed in a tomb (Mark 6: 21 - 29). Concerning the finding of his holy head, see February 24 and May 25.




Stewardship Message

Have you submitted your Stewardship Form? If not, please do so today.

You are a Member of the Church! Are you a Steward also?

A question always asked by our parishioners is "How can I be a member of the Parish? I am already an Orthodox Christian. Isn't that enough?

The answer to this is very simple: All people baptized and chrismated (confirmed) in the Orthodox Church are automatically members of the Church, but it takes a little more to be "members in good standing" in the Orthodox Church and in the Parish. First, it is required that a person be married in the Church and live their life as an Orthodox Christian, participating in the Holy Sacraments, in order to be in good standing within the Orthodox Church. If one has been married outside the Orthodox Church or has gone through a civil divorce and has not obtained a Church divorce may not be in good standing with the Church. Please check with the priest of the parish in order to find out where you are.

How can one be a member of the Parish?

It takes participation in the parish by supporting the operation and ministries of the parish to be a member in good standing. In order to do that, you have to fill out the Membership/Stewardship Form and indicate on it how you are going to participate in the Parish with your Time, Talents and Treasure. When you join the Parish in this way you make a Pledge to God that you will support the work of the Church with the gifts He has given you so that the Gospel may be preached and people may be saved through the ministries of the Church. 
