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
Directions to our Parish:

Fr. Panayiotis' Message

May-June 2020



God's Mystical Presence in the midst of fear!

Personally, I experienced Holy Week and Pascha this year from a very unique perspective; as a matter of fact, from the *other side* of how you experienced it. So, I want to share a few things with you, especially as a response to the many comments I received during the last few weeks, as we have been live-streaming the worship services.

As the church was empty, many a time during the services, I felt the need to check my iPad and occasionally my laptop, sitting in the back of the altar area, to get a feel as to who was praying with me. Seeing empty pews every time I turned around, speaking to the camera and blessing people from a distance through electrons and photons traveling almost at the speed of light throughout the globe, was both an unsettling experience, but a mysterious and miraculous one at the same time.

I kept reading the comments of the people watching the services from around the world and it was amazing; they could see me and the others of the liturgical team. Some people would comment on the beauty of our church, others on the wonderful hymns and others on the sweetness of the voices of the chanters. They felt as if they were present there with us. And in some ways, they were!

On the human level, I yearned to see people's faces, people crossing themselves as we mentioned the name of God and the Theotokos, people kneeling as we processed the cross on Holy Thursday and the Epitaphios on Holy Friday. I wanted to see the smiling faces of my parishioners as we chanted Xristos Anesti, like every year, but it was not possible. But you, on the other hand, could see me and the others as we served in the church and you were present there with us!

As I occasionally went back to the iPad or the laptop to see who was watching and how many people were logged in, the mysterious and miraculous overwhelmed me. The eight or nine of us of the liturgical team were not alone, as we offered worship to God! Hundreds, and at times thousands of people, were worshipping with us, even though we could not see you. You were "*as if in an other dimension*" of existence but connecting with us continually through the technological marvel of the camera, electricity, wifi, airwaves, electrons, and what we know as the Internet.

This is not very different from the way we exist in relationship to God, the saints, the angels and even our loved ones who have passed away. They all exist *"as if in an other dimension"* and yet we can communicate with them. We cannot see them, but they can see us. We cannot hear them, but they can hear us. Our words and even our thoughts can reach them. Our prayers can be received and heard by them, just like you could hear and see us and participate in the services through the marvel of technology during the live streams.

This is where all of this comes together: If man is able to create such a marvelous way of communicating across the World in an instant, cannot the Creator of this World be able to have a system of communication that can span distance and time? Can He not be able to receive our worship in His own space and time and also be present with us at the same time? Could He not have made it so that He can also communicate back to us so that we may receive His messages, if we log in, and tune in to His Voice?

Feasts of June

June 11

Revelation of the Hymn "Axion Estin" to a monk on Mt. Athos by the Archangel Gabriel

The Synaxis of the Icon of the Most Holy Theotokos is celebrated June 11 for the following reason: In 980, during the reign of Emperor Basil II, when Nicholas Chrysoberges was Ecumenical Patriarch (984-995), the holy Archangel Gabriel appeared in the guise of a monk to the disciple of a certain elder living in a hermitage belonging to the monastery of Pantocrator on the Holy Mountain.

During Matins, after the monk had chanted the customary hymn, "More Honorable than the Cherubim...," composed by Saint Cosmas the Hymnographer, the Archangel chanted the same hymn, but with the following prelude: "It is truly meet to call thee blest, the Theotokos, the ever-blessed and most pure, and Mother of

our God." Marveling at the hymn's beauty, the monk asked his visitor – who appeared also to be a monk - to record this new text in writing, which the Archangel did by miraculously inscribing the words on a piece of slate, using only his finger, and then vanished from sight.

This slate was brought to the Church of the Protaton, and from thence to Constantinople, to the imperial court and the Ecumenical Patriarchate, as evidence of the miracle. Henceforth, this version of the hymn to the Most Holy Theotokos began to be chanted in the Divine Liturgy in all the churches. The place where the miracle took place is now called Adein, for the Greek word which means "to sing." The icon itself, before which this hymn was first chanted, is called "The Icon of the Axion Estin" ("It is truly meet") and it is kept in the sanctuary of the Church of the Protaton on the Holy Mountain.


Aploytikion in the Fourth Tone

Ye hosts of the Fathers of Mount Athos, gather today, and shout with a voice of jubilation, leaping for joy, and faithfully keeping feast: For, behold, the praise of the most pure Theotokos wondrously and awesome is sung by the Angel; and therefore, as the Mother of God, we glorify her name.

Kontakion in the Fourth Tone

All of Athos keepeth feast this day in gladness; for it wondrously received from on Archangel's holy hand the hymn whereby thou hast ever been praised as the Mother of God, as is truly meet.

Feasts of June



June 24 The Nativity of the Forerunner John the Baptist

Apolytikion in the Fourth Tone O Prophet and Forerunner of the presence of Christ, we who fervently honor you cannot worthily praise you. For by your revered and glorious birth the barrenness of your mother and the muteness of your father were unbound, and the incarnation of the Son of God is proclaimed to the world.

Kontakion in the Third Tone She that once was barren doth today bring forth Christ's Forerunner, John, the culmination and the crown of all the Prophets. For when he, in River Jordan, laid his hand on Him Whom the Prophets preached aforetime, he was revealed as God the Word's fore-chosen Prophet, His mighty preacher, and His Forerunner in grace.

He that was greater than all who are born of women, the Prophet who received God's testimony that he surpassed all the Prophets, was born of the aged and barren Elizabeth (Luke 1: 7) and filled all his kinsmen, and those that lived round about, with gladness and wonder. But even more wondrous was that which followed on the eighth day when he was circumcised, that is, the day on which a male child receives his name. Those present called him Zacharias, the name of his father. But the mother said, "Not so, but he shall be called John." Since the child's father was unable to speak, he was asked, by means of a sign, to indicate the child's name. He then asked for a tablet and wrote, "His name is John." And immediately Zacharias' mouth was opened, his tongue was loosed from its silence of nine months, and filled with the Holy Spirit, he blessed the God of Israel, Who had fulfilled the promises made to their fathers, and had visited them that were sitting in darkness and the shadow of death, and had sent to them the light of salvation. Zacharias prophesied concerning the child also, saying that he would be a Prophet of the Most High and Forerunner of Jesus Christ. And the child John, who was filled with grace, grew and waxed strong in the Spirit; and he was in the wilderness until the day of his showing to Israel (Luke 1:57-80). His name is a variation of the Hebrew "Johanan," which means "God is gracious."

Feasts of June



June 29 The Feast of the Apostles Peter and Paul

Peter was from Bethsaida of Galilee. He was the son of Jonas and the brother of Andrew the Firstcalled. He was a fisherman by trade, unlearned and poor, and was called Simon; later he was renamed Peter by the Lord Jesus Christ Himself, Who looked at him and said, "Thou art Simon the son of Jonas; thou shalt be called Cephas (which is by interpretation, Peter)" (John 1:42). On being raised by the Lord to the dignity of an Apostle and becoming inseparable from Him as His zealous disciple, he followed Him from the beginning of His preaching of salvation up until the very Passion, when, in the court of Caiaphas the high priest, he denied Him thrice because of his fear of the Jews and of the danger at hand. But again, after many bitter tears, he received complete forgiveness of his transgression. After the Resurrection of Christ and the descent of the Holy Spirit, he preached in Judea, Antioch, and certain parts of Asia, and finally came to Rome, where he was crucified upside down by Nero about the year 66 or 68, leaving two Catholic (Universal) Epistles to the Church of Christ and a legacy of faith.

Paul, the chosen vessel of Christ, the glory of the

Church, the Apostle of the Nations and teacher of the whole world, was a Jew by race, of the tribe of Benjamin, having Tarsus as his homeland. He was a Roman citizen, fluent in the Greek language, an expert in knowledge of the Law, a Pharisee, born of a Pharisee, and a disciple of Gamaliel, a Pharisee and notable teacher of the Law in Jerusalem. For this cause, from the beginning, Paul was a most fervent zealot for the traditions of the Jews and a great persecutor of the Church of Christ; at that time, his name was Saul (Acts 22:3-4). In his great passion of rage and fury against the disciples of the Lord, he went to Damascus bearing letters of introduction from the high priest. His intention was to bring the disciples of Christ back to Jerusalem in bonds. As he was approaching Damascus, about midday there suddenly shone upon him a light from Heaven. Falling on the earth, he heard a voice saying to him, "Saul, Saul, why persecutest thou Me?" And he asked, "Who art Thou, Lord?" And the Lord said, "I am Jesus Whom thou persecutest; it is hard for thee to kick against the pricks." And that heavenly voice and brilliance made him tremble, and he was blinded for a time. He was led by the hand into the city, and on account of a divine revelation to the Apostle Ananias (see Oct. 1), he was baptized by him, and both his bodily and spiritual eyes were opened to the knowledge of the Sun of Righteousness. And straightway- O wondrous transformation! - beyond all expectation, he spoke with boldness in the synagogues, proclaiming that "Christ is the Son of God" (Acts 9:1-21). As for his zeal in preaching the Gospel after these things had come to pass, as for his unabating labors and afflictions of diverse kinds, the wounds, the prisons, the bonds, the beatings, the stonings, the shipwrecks.

Having completed the work of his ministry, Paul likewise ended his life in martyrdom when he was beheaded in Rome during the reign of Nero, at the same time, some say, when Peter was crucified.

Instructions for setting up a profile and giving through Vanco are summarized below. Setting up a profile allows your donations to be credited to your Stewardship pledge.

To donate using Vanco:

- 2. Select the "Online giving" link near the top of the home page
- 3. Select the "Give online" link
- 4. Click on the "Create Profile" link (very important to create a profile
- 5. Follow the onscreen instructions to create an online profile
- 6. Choose the funds you would like to donate. Your donation can either be one time or recurring (i.e. daily, weekly or monthly)

Finding Rest As A Family

Some monks came to see abba Poemen and said to him, 'When we see brothers dozing during the services in church, should we rouse them so that they can be watching?' He said to them, 'For my part, when I see a brother dozing, I put his head on my knees and let him rest.

-Sayings of the Desert Fathers

I think this crisis is impacting us way more than we think. It's easy to want to respond with our usual productivity 'muscle,' when we're surrounded by chaos and uncertainty. This causes an extreme internal collision, as it is almost impossible to be 'productive' on the same level as before during this time. I imagine it's definitely true for young people and families.

But is that such a bad thing?

Certainly there are very legitimate concerns about our economy and personal financial well-being, and I don't mean to undermine those at all.

Yet it comes as no surprise, I feel, that our culture struggles with extremes--workaholism on the one hand and unhealthy entertainment on the other.

Finding rest--whether it is through meaningful labor or real and rejuvenating leisure--is, frankly, really tough.

It's particularly important that families and young people find ways to consistently rest and rejuvenate on all levels of their being--physically, emotionally, intellectually, relationally and, of course, spiritually.

There are some great resources out there for how to find rest in many of these domains.

What does it mean to find rest spiritually?

Consistent prayer both personally and as a family can be a huge source of inspiration and strength, especially during times of crisis.

And yet I wonder if perhaps the biggest issue isn't more of a mindset shift.

I once heard a story about a young person who came to a priest seeking advice about prayer. The priest gave him what he thought was a fairly reasonable recommendation for a daily prayer habit (something like 15 minutes a day), to which the young person responded that it felt like too much.

The priest then proceeded to ratchet it down notch by notch--10 minutes? No, still too much. 3 minutes? Don't think so. Finally the priest asked: do you tie your shoes in the morning?

A little surprised the young man said, of course! Okay, replies the priest, then, when you bend down to tie your left shoe say "Lord, Jesus Christ, have mercy on me" and when you bend down to tie your right shoe say the same prayer. Then when you come back home and bend down to untie your shoes, do it again.

The young man left feeling like this was something that he could do! Within the course of months, his prayer life had increased dramatically from that seemingly insignificant start.

Moral of the story: we all need to find our place somewhere between doing everything and doing nothing. For most of us, it might initially start just a notch above doing nothing. But there are also those who have achieved great heights of virtue and asceticism and are, perhaps, just a notch away from achieving everything. Point is, we need to find our sweet spot.

I end with a beautiful reminder from our beloved St. Porphyrios of Kavsokalyvia:

"Things are simple and easy in the spiritual life, in the life in Christ, as long as you possess discernment. When something bothers you - a seductive thought, a temptation, an assault - ignore all these things, and turn your attention, your eyes, to Christ. He will then take over the task of raising you up. He will take you by the hand and will give you His divine grace abundantly. All you need to do is make a tiny little effort" (Wounded By Love, p. 150).





A most Unusual Great Lent, Holy Week and Pascha

The experience brought about by the COVIT-19 health crisis around the world will go down in history as an unprecedented one, but also filled with many stories and different perspectives especially from the "Lockdown" which forced people to stay away from church and the holy services of Holy Week and Pascha. We are still in the midst of the crisis and we do not even know how it will end, but we pray that God will spare us of the pain, suffering and death which we have seen in so many places.

I received messages from many people from our parish and even people from other places and other countries, as they tuned in to our live streams of the divine services and reacted to the music, the hymns and sermons and the beauty of what the Orthodox Church has to offer, which most of us usually take for granted. The most common comment was *"THANK YOU, for making it possible that we may turn our homes into churches during this sacred time"*.

I would like to share here a few comments in order to give you an idea of how some people reacted. I will hold their identities, since I did not ask for their permission to publish their comments.

Since a picture is worth a thousand words, I decided to share a couple of pictures to let you know that we were THERE with you and we love you all very much. It was so wonderful that you make us feel like you are talking to us and blessing us personally throughout the service. We loved and were fascinated by the view at the altar. We don't know HOW Strati manages everything from behind the camera: video, audio, changing the scene, monitoring the chat, etc. – he's amazing. It was so nice to get to know Strati through this process as well. I'm sure he has no idea who [we] are, but we know and really appreciate him.

[My wife] said something that I thought was a perfect way to describe how impressed we are with what a monumental accomplishment this has been for Trisagion Films and for the benefit of all of us. [She] said 'You know...Father is like Noah. God gave him an incredible responsibility with almost no time to prepare and he, with his family (members of the Church family and home family) has to provide for the entire world for 40 days or more.'

We just love you and the efforts of everyone who brought the wonderfulness of Holy Week and Pascha to us. Please give Strati, Olympia, Presvytera, and YOU a hug of love and appreciation from the [our] family."

A Message from our Director:

COVID-19 has not stopped our mission to bring young people closer to their faith through Greek Dance. Since the closures of school and church, the Hellenic Dance Ministry has posted online classes for all our dancers every week. In a sense, they still have Greek Dance class, but only at home using the internet to help teach them. In our lessons, we tie in the significance of the dance to our faith, this way young people learn why Greek Dance has a place in our parish and our community. Many teachers have been communicating with their classes and keeping the bonds that we normally build during this time alive and well. The spirit of dance continues whether it is in person or via internet.

All of us are disappointed that we will not have our annual Greek Festival this year. The festival is the peak of our ministry and the way in which we feel most useful to our parish. The memories built during the time of practice and performance is something that bonds our youth. The dancers build friendships and then they want to stay a part of the parish, they want to come to church more because of these bonds. We see that in our young adult dancers aged 18-33. This age range is the most critical in an Orthodox Christian's life. We plan to keep reaching out to all our dancers, but specifically these young adults in order to maintain the progress we have made over the years in this age group. Alex Matthews has organized Zoom gatherings for our young adults to keep them connected. She has reached out to many of them personally to let them know that their church and the program they love is still thinking about them and that we will be there waiting for them to return after the all clear is given.

As you all know, it is an incredibly sad year for our high school seniors. They have missed out on prom, senior trips, and most heart breaking, graduation. Now they have lost a highlight of their church year – dancing at the Festival. It has been a long-time tradition here in Marietta to announce each senior at the last performance on Saturday night of the festival. We did not want them to miss another milestone, so I had a photo book put together to remember and honor them. Stay tuned for more details on those activities. We pray that everyone is healthy and safe. We will be here, ready to dance when this is all over!





After much thought and careful consideration, Holy Transfiguration Greek Orthodox Church has made the decision to cancel the 2020 Marietta Greek Festival. As the COVID-19 situation continues to evolve, our utmost concern is for the health and safety of our guests, neighbors, and church family.

This decision to cancel rather than postpone the 2020 annual Greek Festival took into account several considerations:

1.Postponing to later in the year, such as September or October, would conflict with other Greek Orthodox churches in the metro Atlanta area. We did not want to compete with them nor risk a lower attendance and revenue.

2.The decision was also made to keep the same weekend for 2021 as we have a following and it would be in our best interest to maintain the same weekend every year for consistency in marketing. Incidentally, Orthodox Easter in 2021 in on May 2nd.

3.Since we are blessed with a robust stewardship, the urgency to receive revenue from the festival was not immediate. However, we will be facing a hardship particularly during the summer months when the festival had previously contributed \$20,000 towards the general operating fund as a "usage fee". With that said, we request that you continue to maintain or increase your stewardship pledge during the summer months.

The festival board and committee members had met over the plan several months and have agreed on a festival plan which we will execute in 2021, such as a slightly modified layout, changes to certain menu items and other logistics. We ask for your continued commitment and support as we plan for the 2021 Marietta Greek Festival and beyond. We look forward to working together for our Festival in May 2021 - as always, the weekend after Mother's Day!
